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Letter from the vicarage...

Recently I had the privilege of spending two days in Berlin. It's hard to imagine now, the city being divided. But divided it was. The coming down of the wall was a day that changed the world. Maybe the moon landings, 9/11, or the Cuban missile crisis, might also be days to go alongside it.



As we enter Lent, a reading for Ash

Wednesday points to another day – still to come – which will change the world. The prophet Joel many years ago called it the 'day of the Lord'. The Bible speaks of it as the day when Jesus comes back to this earth. To judge all that is wrong (including our wrong) and to bring those who have run to him for mercy into his kingdom of life.

How are we to be ready for that day? How does that connect to Lent?

Joel said: 'Rend your heart, and not your garments. Return to the Lord your God for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity.' Joel 2:13

That is what is needed of the person who'll be able to endure that day. A returning to God which involves all of us.

In Joel's day rending, or ripping clothes, was a sign of being sorry. But God says he doesn't want token gestures. Empty rituals. 'Sorry' but with no real meaning. He wants us.

They gave all the signs of 'sorry' – but there was no change in seeking to trust him. And God called them from this outward following.

It is the same today. It's very possible to give up something for Lent, to fast, or live simpler, and think I've done my bit.

But Joel says if that is all they are - outward signs – they're useless.

Living simpler in Lent or taking something up, can be good, especially if it helps us to reflect on God. But what God really wants is us, not our chocolate. Our hearts and not our habits.

Why would we return to him in the first place? Because the judge is also the gracious one. The one we've turned from, is also the one who turns to us. That is the call to all of us - return to God, that we might be ready for that day.

For Lent, if you are planning on doing things differently, let it be a token of your life given back to God.

Youth Provísíon Development Project

There are approximately 1500+ young people (11-18) living, studying or enjoying leisure time within our parish. That is a lot of young people! We connect to a small number of those, and for that we are thankful. But there are many more we do not.



The Youth Provision Development Project is a project of Blackburn Diocese to help support churches like us. It was born out of a passion to see churches connect with more young people. The team come alongside a church to walk with them and empower them to have a greater impact on the young people in the parish.

The first part of the project has begun at St Paul's in February – the formation of a 360° group. This group is made up of 10 members of St Paul's, ranging in age, length of time being a member of St Paul's, experience and includes young people and parents. The Diocese comes alongside this group, running exercises, workshops and discussions to help us reflect on where we are currently in our provision, and then to form possible next steps going forward. The group met in February and will meet in March and April.

Some highlights from other churches taking part already have been:

- \Rightarrow working with people of all ages to discuss the vision for the future
- ⇒ encouraging a church as they work with their local high school to initiate prayer spaces
- \Rightarrow helping a church plan a youth weekend away
- $\Rightarrow\,$ being a sounding board for church leaders as they consider plans to raise the next generation

So, watch this space to see where God might take us! If you would like to feed in your reflections to the process, speak to Paul who can put you in touch with a member of the 360° group.

Answer: These are all elements of a weekend residential in Blackburn Diocese, which Paul is involved in leading. Run under the banner of the Church of England based charity, CPAS, the Schools Venture is an opportunity to support local

churches in forging stronger relationships with their church school. It also gives the young people the opportunity to explore key aspects of the Christian faith in the context of a fun filled weekend!

The young people become junior investigators seeking to solve the 'Case of the Empty Tomb' looking at the evidence and meaning of Jesus' death and resurrection from the last chapters of Luke's gospel. It takes place at Hothersall Lodge near Longridge from Friday 6th to Sunday 8th March.

Last year was the first one in the Diocese, full of fun, but also full of rain! Please do be praying for Paul and the team as they lead the weekend; for safety, fun, good weather, good relationships and young people to have the opportunity to discover more about Jesus.



The Way of the Cross

The Revd Canon Paul Hardingham considers what it means to follow Jesus.



Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow Me.' (Luke 9: 23)

These words of Jesus are spoken at a turning point in the gospel. Jesus challenges the disciples about His identity and their commitment to Him: *'Who do the crowds say I am?'* (18). It is at this point that He *'resolutely set out for Jerusalem'* (9:51). On our journey through Lent, as we look to events of Good Friday and Easter, what are our priorities as Jesus' disciples to be?

To deny ourselves: this means to saying *No* to ourselves and Yes to God, as we humbly submit our will to His. Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane *'not My will but Yours be done.'* (Luke 22:42). It means putting Jesus first in everything: our work, family, ambitions, possessions, marriage, finance and future. We will not be guided by self-interest, but by allowing God to show us how to live in His way.

To take up our cross: this reminds us that the disciple is not immune from suffering, as we follow Jesus along the way of cross. Just as He carried His cross to Golgotha, we cannot avoid experiencing suffering in a fallen world. Every day we are to live in way that demonstrates to

everyone that we have died to ourselves, our selfish ways and ambitions, and seek to live for God. It means breaking old selfish habits and ways of thinking, as we allow God to renew us by His Spirit.

In all of this we cannot lose, because like Jesus, it is only through death that we find God's new life. *'He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep, to gain that which he cannot lose.'* (Jim Elliot)

Woodlands Welcome has been running since October 2019, every Wednesday afternoon between 2pm and 4pm in the St Paul's Fundraising Shop. The door is open, and everyone is welcome. Whether you are on Woodlands Road and just happen upon it or are coming specifically for it. Some guests have come for 10 minutes, others for the whole 2 hours!

It is run by a team of 10 volunteers from St Paul's on a rota – offering free tea or coffee to any who come. Our aim is to offer welcome to the community – like our God and pointing our God.

Since October we have welcomed a regular group from a local care home, as well as people looking for company, people on the way to pick grandchildren up, people who thought the shop was open and stayed... and many more. Approximately 35 different people have been welcomed at different points.

It has been a real encouragement to make new contacts in our community, and to see it positively received. Do be praying that relationships would continue to be forged, for wisdom as we go forward, and for God to use it for his kingdom.

When Spring Comes

'See! The winter is past; the rains are over and gone. Flowers appear on the earth; the season of singing has come, the cooing of doves is heard in our land.' Song of Songs 2:11-12



March is the month that I associate with the coming of Spring, my favourite time of the year, and such a relief after the darkness and gloom of Winter. This verse beautifully describes the joy that most of us feel as the days begin to brighten, and Nature starts to awaken once again.

These words also speak to us about a new season in life, one that is filled with hope and expectation. Sometimes we experience the darkness of winter in our lives – maybe in the form of depression, bereavement, chronic illness, family difficulties, financial problems and so on. These long winter months of the soul may seem to last forever. Our joy disappears, our energy dissipates, our mood is low. A thick black cloud hangs over us and it seems as if the sun will never shine again.

Then we have this reminder that no season lasts for ever. The cold grip of Winter gradually thaws and gives way to warmer days. The sun does shine again, and the temperature rises. Birds sing and flowers blossom. The sap rises. Love is in the air.

And in the spiritual realm the same happens. Eventually we will enter a new season of the soul. Joy returns and life gets back to something like normality. No darkness lasts for ever. We experience our own awakening, a kind of mini resurrection. We start to feel alive again, to



see possibilities and to dream again.

In the depths of Winter, we can look ahead to the certainty of Spring. Faith enables us to believe that the winter of the soul will soon be past as well. In the darkness we choose to hope in God.



Sometimes during Lent people meditate on a passage of scripture.

Here is Psalm 23, looked at with light-hearted modern Christian eyes....

Psalm 23

The Lord is my Shepherd – THAT'S RELATIONSHIP! I shall not want - THAT'S SUPPLY! He maketh me to lie down in green pastures - THAT'S REST! He leadeth me beside still waters - THAT'S REFRESHMENT! 
if we did but think for a moment, in that very act or reaching out, we reveal the presence of the very seed that we seek.

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
