

## Letter from the vicarage...

It feels a strange time. The schools have broken up and the summer holidays have begun. But things just don't feel normal.

For some, they are heading off somewhere overseas, or travelling in the UK. A chance to see some different scenery or finally catch up with friends and family.

For many, that won't be the case. Because of finances, practicalities, health or risk, we will be staying at home – literally.



For everyone, the past 5 months have been stressful and an exhausting time. For some it has been the increased workload, or juggling of priorities. For others, it will have been the difficulty of working from home, or simply the worry or isolation which has worn us down.

So how do we rest when we are potentially at home?

I want to lead us to Jesus. The apostles had had a busy time – they had been on their first mission. This is Jesus' response to them:

'The apostles gathered round Jesus and reported to him all they had done and taught. Then, because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, he said to them, 'Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.' Mark 6:30-31

Two things we see. Jesus recognises we need physical rest.

We all need time to slow down, quieten the race, and recharge our batteries. Many of us might not be able to do that in a different place this summer. But we still all need it.

For some it might mean setting a week or two aside and telling people 'I'm on holiday', setting an 'out of office email' alert, getting some different food in, seeking out some different puzzles or books which we like...whatever. Just to take some time from our normal patterns, and not to be afraid to say 'I am taking time away' (even if here!) for rest.

But Jesus also recognises we need spiritual rest. Rest found only in Him

He takes the disciples away to be with him. To hear from him. To grow to know him better. To see him in action. To enjoy him. Now more than ever in a time of fear, uncertainty and stress, spending time with Jesus is vital.


For he is the one in control, the one who loves his people, who works for their good, who is unchanging when everything is changing. To spend time with Jesus is what is needed.

So make time this summer to spend time with Jesus. Maybe get a Christian book and slowly work through it. Or carve out a little time each day to read some verses from the Bible and just enjoy Jesus. If you need help with both of those things, please do be in touch.

Whatever you are doing this summer, we wish you real rest – physical, but also vitally spiritual. Rest from Jesus, who said, 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest.'

## We will have a reduced capacity on both Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> August – having only one service, not two.



# God Doesn't Mind If You Are Messy ~ says online service

A vicar who has nearly 170,000 followers on Instagram and who regularly broadcasts on YouTube, says that God welcomes us all, however 'messy' we may believe our lives to be.

The Revd Chris Lee, vicar of St Saviour's in Wendell Park, warned against any of us being 'embarrassed' about the state of our lives when considering whether to 'open our hearts' to God or not.


"God is not going to stand at the door of your heart, knock and look in and think to Himself 'you know what, I am not going to come in, it is a little bit messy there'," he said

Chris Lee was leading a recent weekly online service for the Church of England.

He said that Christians are not called to be 'bouncers' who police whether people are leading 'good enough' lives to come to church.

"No, as (the Gospel of) Matthew records Jesus saying, whomever welcomes one of you, welcomes Me. Anyone is welcome, God's grace is sufficient for all of our needs."


He added: "God's welcome is wide, His love is deep, He is generous to all who come to Him. As Christians we should be welcoming. We are not called to be bouncers at the doors of our churches seeing if people are good enough, clean enough, moral enough, to come in, we should be welcoming to all people."



## Getting To Know Next Door

This time last year, how well did you know your neighbours? Around one in five of us have since admitted that we had never even spoken to them.

What a difference a pandemic makes. Now twice as many of us have talked to our neighbours in the past week as compared with last year. A further one in three of us have also done something to help a neighbour. This works out to 33 million people having talked to a neighbour in the



Seven in 10 of us also said that people in our area are now more likely to stop for a chat, and three quarters of us want their newfound friendliness to continue.

The survey was commissioned for the Big Lunch, a National Lottery-supported initiative from the Eden Project.



## When Tourists Get Lost

Have you ever got into trouble while abroad? The true story is told of a group of tourists who went to Israel some years ago and arrived in Jerusalem very eager to see the sites of the old city.

Four members of the group were so engrossed in taking pictures of each other by the Wailing Wall that they ignored the summons from the tour group leader to go back to the bus.



A little while later, they realised that they were all on their own in Jerusalem. That's when their problems started.


The four tourists decided to head back to their hotel. But no one could remember the exact name of the hotel. So, they hailed a taxi, and asked it to drive around Jerusalem looking for the hotel. An hour or so later, the driver gave up and demanded payment.


That's when they discovered that they did not have enough money to pay the driver. So the driver took them to the police, who demanded some identification. That's when the four tourists remembered that they had left their passports in the hotel safe...

Some hours later, the tour guide tracked down the missing tourists. They greeted her with tears of relief as she provided the police with their passports, paid their debt, and prepared to lead them safely back to their hotel. The police gave some parting advice to the tourists: "From now on, you stay close to your friend!"

Stay close to your friend. It's good advice for all of us. If your life is going in the wrong direction, if you have run up debts of wrong-doing, if you feel lost and alone, you need to take action. You need to stop going on like this. Turn around and go in another direction. The Bible calls this action of 'stopping and turning around' repentance.

Repentance is when you stop one direction, and you *turn* to God. For the good news is that there *is* a heavenly tour guide on whom we can all call. Only God can save us from the mess we are in. He sent us His Son to forgive us our sins, to provide us with an identity, and, if we walk with Him, lead us safely through life. As the Bible says: "The wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Romans 6:23)



## CAP still helping people out of debt

Christians Against Poverty (CAP) have been thanking their donors for helping "some wonderful things happen" despite the challenge of coronavirus.

"These beautiful moments were made possible by your support," says Paula Stringer, UK chief executive of CAP. "We've been able to make sure our clients don't go without essentials like food, fuel and staying in touch with loved ones. Our frontline workers have distributed 345 instances of emergency client support so far, and they will be able to continue providing this for many more.

When one client could not get to the supermarket because her car needed repairs, she was astonished to find that her Debt Coach, Beth, had arranged for a delivery of groceries to her house. In return, she sent this message:


"I was so shocked and welling up. It was such an amazing thing to do. Your gift came at the right time, as I wouldn't have had enough to get that much food."

During lockdown, CAP has adjusted its service to offer phone appointments to clients, 479 of these so far.

"We've also seen a fabulous 494 people become debt free during lockdown! Despite the new challenges, we're seeing that there really is always hope," says Paula Stringer.

## Eternity in the Human Heart

'He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end.' (Ecclesiastes 3:11).

The 60s hit 'Turn! Turn! Turn!' by the Byrds is based on verses in this chapter: 'There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens.' The different seasons of life are not random, for God is in control and His timing is perfect: 'He has made everything beautiful in its time.'

The verse goes on to say that God 'has also set eternity in the human heart.' This means that we all have an in-built sense that there's more to life than what we can see, as we search for meaning in life. However, we can fill our lives with other things: career, pleasure, shopping and relationships. While good in themselves, these things can never ultimately satisfy. It is only a relationship with God through Jesus that truly satisfies. How does this challenge us?

Firstly, we are to live for God in all that we do, knowing that it all counts for eternity. This includes helping others find a personal relationship with Jesus Christ for eternity.

Secondly, we accept that there is lots in the current 'season' where it's difficult to know what God is doing: 'no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end.' However, we do know that everything has consequences for eternity.

Finally, how can we be more aware of eternity every day? Spending time with God in worship and prayer will bring us the true pleasure that belongs to eternity.

'You made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless until they find their rest in you.' (St Augustine).


## Lockdown Worship




#### No Change?!
