



Letter from the vicarage...

If there is one emotion surrounding us at this time, it is fear. Whether it is at the national level or in our own personal lives, fear is real and close to many of us. Perhaps it is fear of what this winter might bring, for our health or of isolation. Fear of things changing once again, of what others might think of me, of going out, of missing out, fear of failure, or even fear of fear.





But fear can also panic us to make impulsive decisions or paralyse us into making no decisions. It can make us to turn in on ourselves and away from others. It can cast a shadow that obscures our view of Jesus. In the media, the government has been accused of acting out of anxiety. But closer to home, I know I have acted out of fear and I suspect you will have too, which is why we need each other's help. It may hit us in different ways — but fear is something many of us will be battling with.

So what hope is there?

When Paul wrote to a younger minister called Timothy, who himself was faced with situations which brought fear, he said:

'For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline' (2 Timothy 1:7)

Paul says this to Timothy in light of the ministry he undertakes. However, the same Spirit is given to all Jesus' followers.

The Spirit enables us to push against fear. Because He gives us:-

Power – The Spirit leads us to Jesus and the good news about him – the gospel, which is God's power. Power which says if we are trusting Jesus, death is not ultimately something to fear, for Jesus has made a way through it. Power which says to us though you are weak, Jesus' strength is sufficient to help you. Power which says Jesus is with us, which gives us power to move forward and not simply stand still or go backward.

Love – The Spirit reminds us of God's unstopping love. It leads to us to keep showing that love to others. Not to withdraw from our neighbours or our church family, focusing on what is easy or comfortable for me.

But instead the power to love them in the ways we are able from the different places in which we find ourselves (for we all find ourselves in different situations, and how we love each other will look different too).

Self-Discipline - That is hard. It is not always simple. So the Spirit helps us to be disciplined to fight against the temptation to give up or give in. The Spirit helps us to be disciplined in thinking through what is the wise thing to do in any situation. Sometimes that will mean being cautious and careful. The opposite of fear is not carelessness. But sometimes it will mean a step out of our comfort zone trusting God. Disciplined in taking our eyes back to Jesus when fear takes root.

Let's pray for each other that as we all likely battle fear in some way, we would know the Spirit's power, love and discipline at work in our hearts. What we pray for ourselves, pray for our nation – that as they see Jesus, they would find in him a balm against fear.

PCC Update

The PCC is meeting twice in September. Our meetings continue to be online due to our current situation. The Standing Committee and Shop Oversight Committee have also met this month. Here are headlines regarding things discussed at the first meeting, and due to be discussed at the second (taking place after PNE is published):

September 8th Meeting:

- A discussion was had regarding the shorter term and longer term shape of St Paul's services. As a church, we find ourselves at a juncture. We were already beginning to ask 'what shape ought we to be for the future?' Our current times compound that. Our world has changed and it is right to ask how the church ought to change. It is an opportunity which is both exciting and painful.
- The first two months of physical/ live stream services were reviewed and discussions had regarding ways to increase capacity for those who are able to return. Further work is being carried out before the second PCC to enable firmer shorter terms plans to be formed.
- A review of each of our services was agreed to help us discern what the Lord might be leading us too in terms of the shape of our longer term future.
- The Covid19 Secure Risk Assessment for the Parish Hall was accepted, and plans for the return of existing hirers discussed, as well as proposals which hirers had put forward.
- An update on Fabric was received.

September 28th Meeting:

- Our shorter term and longer term shape will be discussed further, including initial discussion on the Diocese's new Vision for Children and Young People, which will feed into those reflections.
- Our Parish Finances will be reviewed to further assess the impact of Covid19, and any decision which need to be made. Diocesan finances will also be discussed.

To whom shall we go?

Prior to my ordination, I was asked to fill in a questionnaire, which would be put up on the diocesan website, alongside the responses of other incoming curates. The questions were intended to serve as a short introduction to each one of us.

Among other things, I was invited to share my favourite Bible verse, and say why that verse stuck out to me.

My favourite Bible verse, to which I very often return, is John 6:68, where Peter, speaking to Jesus, says, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

Though Jesus was initially popular, his teaching was controversial. His miracles attracted great crowds, and his healings drew many to him. But after a particularly controversial sermon (John 6), many slink away: even those who had been his loyal followers up until that point deserted Jesus. This seems to be one of the crucial turning points between Jesus' initial popularity and his eventual total rejection. His words divided people, and the majority, in the end, was against him.


But when Jesus asks the twelve if they also intend to desert him, Peter responds, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." If they ceased to listen to Jesus' words, whose words would they listen to? If they ceased to follow him, whom would they follow instead? Peter knows that, though Jesus' words are hard to swallow sometimes, Jesus is the one with the truth, because Jesus has come from God. Deserting Jesus therefore would be disastrous. Peter knows that from no one except Jesus will he find life-giving truth. It's the same for you and me.

I was once an atheist, and, before I became a Christian, I went from one belief system to another. But I was never satisfied. I'm naturally a sceptic and a questioner. Every way of thinking I had embraced before becoming a Christian, I eventually found to be disastrously flawed. If atheism is true, how did the world begin? If Marx was right, why did all his predictions fail? I could go on. Only when I came to Jesus did I find that, the further I went into Jesus and his teaching, the more morally, intellectually, and spiritually satisfied I became.

But, having a sceptical mind and an atheistic background means I sometimes struggle with doubts about my faith, as many do. Is it all true? Did Jesus truly die and rise again? Am I saved? Is the Word of God accurate in what it says? But when these doubts arise, God never fails to draw me back to himself. God often uses Peter's words to do it: "To whom shall I go?" If not Jesus, then who, or what?

No philosopher or statesman even remotely compares to the wisdom and goodness of Jesus Christ. None can make sense of the world and the way things are - and the way I am! - like Jesus can. We've said this a couple of times in our John series, but it's true: when we get to know Jesus better, we actually get to know ourselves better as well. Nobody else offers that I know that there is no one else to whom I can go. Only Jesus has the words of eternal life.

News from The Diocese

The Anglican Bishops for the North West of England (incorporating the dioceses of Blackburn, Carlisle, Chester, Liverpool, Manchester, and Sodor and Man) have announced plans to form a brand-new independent theological college in the

region. This decision reflects their commitment to the provision of outstanding theological training and formation for lay and ordained leaders and follows a prolonged period of careful discernment, including detailed research by the Rt Rev Graham James and others.

The new independent college, will be known as Emmanuel Theological College and will celebrate the rich breadth of traditions in the Church of England. It will enable both part-time and full-time access for students from a variety of backgrounds, so that all may learn, grow, and flourish together as they are formed in Christ's service.

In response to the needs of the region, the new college will also seek to provide pathways for groups that have previously found it difficult to access training. As the Bishop of Manchester, the Rt Rev David Walker, explains "there are many people who are called by God, but who currently find it hard to access the training they need. My episcopal colleagues and I are determined that this new college will enable people from diverse backgrounds to pursue ministry in the Church of England."



The Rev Dr Michael Leyden (left) has been appointed as the first Dean of Emmanuel Theological College and will be supported by the Bishop of Chester, the Rt Rev Mark Tanner (below right), as Chair-elect of the Emmanuel Theological College Board of Trustees. Together they will

be charged with delivering outstanding formational and vocational training for lay and ordained church leaders, in what is expected to be a nationally recognised


centre of excellence for theological education. Once it is fully operational, the college is expected to have around 250 students, which will make it one of the largest theological colleges in the country.

Understanding the Bible

Canon Paul Hardingham considers the authority of the Bible.



As we acknowledge Bible Sunday this month, it's a good opportunity to ask the question: why should I read the Bible?

The Bible is the world's best-selling book of all time. However, it isn't one book, but a library of 66 books, composed by some 44 writers over a period of 1500 years in a range of literature including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic (end times). Despite having a number of different

writers, the Bible claims one author: God himself!

This is the basis of the unity of its message and authoritative claim to be the primary way by which God speaks to us: 'All Scripture is Godbreathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and presents itself as a manual for life, equipping us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit to guide us in applying the words to our lives: 'the Spirit will guide you into all truth' (John 16:13).

However, the Bible could also be described as a *love letter* from God, as He uses it to deepen our relationship with him. As Jesus said: 'You diligently study the Scriptures because you think that by them you possess eternal life. These are the Scriptures that testify about me' (John 5:39,40). Christians follow a person not a book, and the Scriptures are intended to help us to know Jesus better.

At her coronation the Queen was given a Bible with the words 'the most precious thing this world affords'. Does this reflect our own attitude to the Bible?

Persecuted Christians

has increased during Covid, says Release

International, which has launched an appeal to help Christians suffering during the pandemic. Many Christians have been denied food and relief aid and excluded from support systems during lockdown. They have been abandoned by families because of their faith and refused relief by governments and NGOs. Several countries have stepped up persecution against Christians.

"The situation has got much worse for many Christians during lockdown," says Release International CEO Paul Robinson.

"Covid-19 is having a devastating impact on the lives of many poor Christians. In places hostile to the faith Christians are experiencing increased hardship. Food is now in short supply. They are unable to work and can't earn, and support is being withheld because of their faith. Their cries for help are being ignored by local charities who are distributing food packages only to families of other faiths. We can't afford to delay. These Christians need our help."

In **Algeria**, many Christians have had to stop work because of the lockdown, and so lost their income. They have been rejected by society and their families as a result of their faith. There is no social security in the country or government support.

In **Pakistan** the situation is especially hard for converts from a Muslim background. The only form of social security is family support, and Muslim families often withdraw support for family members who change their religion.

In Upper **Egypt**, some organisations are allegedly refusing food and support to Christian families. Release partners report: "The authorities are helping Muslims but not Christians. And churches that try to help are being closed by police order."

In **China**, Release partners say the government is using the pandemic to increase its crackdown against Christians. Campaigns such as the forced demolition of crosses, have been accelerated. Pastors have been rounded up for sharing the gospel and distributing facemasks on the street. The authorities have "totally prohibited" online church services and prayer meetings, as "nothing constituting a religious service is allowed."

Paul Robinson of Release International says: "Right now, it's up to us in the family of faith to give them our support." Partners of Release International are providing food parcels to impoverished Christians in Algeria, Ethiopia, Egypt, Nigeria, Pakistan and Turkey.





"On day seven – seven times around "Those mighty walls you go "And shout this time – make lots of sound! "And seven trumpets blow!"


"And you will see, if you do that "The city's walls, so tall "Will start to crack, and fall down flat "And Jericho shall fall!"


