Letter from the vicarage...

Joy to the world! the Lord is come; Let earth receive her King; Let every heart prepare him room, And heaven and nature sing, And heaven and nature sing, And heaven, and heaven, and nature sing.

While fields and floods, rocks, hills, and plains

No more let sins and sorrows grow, Nor thorns infest the ground; He comes to make His blessings flow Far as the curse is found, Far as, far as, the curse is found.

He rules the world with truth and grace, And makes the nations prove The glories of His righteousness, And wonders of His love, And wonders of His love, And wonders, wonders, of His love.



As I write, the words of this wonderful Christmas carol by Isaac Watts come to mind. One of the great sadnesses of this pandemic has been the impact on congregational singing. It is yet to become clear what that will mean for Christmas. But stopping to pause on the words we sing is a fruitful experience nonetheless.

The carol is based on the Bible - taking inspiration from Psalm 98 and Genesis 3. It encapsulates a wonderful truth wrapped in the Christmas story. One of history, not make believe. That the young infant born to Mary, proclaimed by angels, visited by shepherds, worshipped by wise men, is not simply a sweet little child to warm our hearts. He is the Lord drawing near to this world.

Joy to the world! The Lord is come. The baby in the manger is the Lord of heaven and earth. Your creator and mine. The astounding truth is he does not sit distant from a world that is broken and sorrowing. A world impacted by the curse, caused by humanity turning away from God to try to rule itself. He didn't then. He doesn't now. We feel at this time the impact of that curse in the pains and turmoil of a pandemic, with suffering and death around us. To that world Jesus came. God got involved. To our world today he is still involved, active and concerned. That is news of real joy.

But when I am ill, while I want a doctor who can sit by my bed and be with me, what I ultimately want is a doctor who can heal me.

That is what this hymn wonderfully declares. Jesus came into the world to turn curse into blessing. To turn a broken world into one which will be made new. To turn a world where there is death into one where one day death will be defeated. Where a new kind of life can be offered – life as we were made for knowing God now – and which lasts through and beyond death. A world where our turning from God and the separation from him which follows is turned into being able to know our maker intimately. That is news of real joy.

We need Jesus to turn away the curse from this world. A vaccine or other medical treatments, while a source of hope, will not fix our world. Being brought through a pandemic, whilst something we long and pray for, will not sort this greater problem. To pin our hope on those things alone, and not see the greater problem, and the most wonderful solution offered in Jesus is to miss out on the greatest source of joy God is offering us.

So how should we respond? Let earth receive her King; Let every heart prepare him room.

This joy and hope comes through receiving Jesus. Not simply remembering him a few times a year. Not simply knowing about him from Sunday school lessons or church services. But receiving him. Opening our life up to Jesus that the earth's king might become our king. That means other things which currently take the top spot in our life will need to move, maybe even go, that there is room on the throne of our heart for Jesus.

Christmas may be quieter for many of us this year. Can I encourage you to make the most of that time and space to reflect on Jesus, and to receive him into our hearts at king? We will find when we do a joy stronger and brighter than any other.

PCC Update

Since last month's update from the Annual Parochial Church Meeting we have had two PCC meetings. Headlines from the meeting are:

The PCC refreshed itself on its role as a PCC, and its responsibilities as trustees of the charity. It appointed key positions, and determined which positions still need to be filled.

The PCC spend time in both sessions looking at where we had come as a church with regards to our vision and mission, as well as beginning to consider what future we feel the Lord might be leading us too. Key thoughts were collected and discussed. Time was also spent considering the quality of life as a church we are being called to have. The PCC went on to discuss our Christmas ministry and opportunities.

The church's financial position was reviewed, and principles for the 2021 budget were discussed, as well as involvement or not in the Diocesan 'Call to Give'.

The PCC were updated on the Fundraising Shop, including its closure during lockdown, and the furloughing of our two staff.



Our Special Christmas 2019 at Torch Holiday TORCH and Retreat Centre



Torch Trust is a Christian charity which seeks to offer support to blind and visually impaired people, with a particular focus on sharing the gospel of Christ. Blind people who know Christ are helped to grow in their faith; those who have yet to come to know him are invited to come to know him through their resources and ministry. Until the end of last year, Torch ran the Holiday and Retreat Centre, in Hurstpierport, West Sussex. The centre ran holidays for blind and visually impaired people, and encouraged volunteers to come on the holidays, and help with the work.

Because many of the blind people who benefited from this ministry were lonely, Torch ran one of its holidays over the Christmas week, including Christmas day. The Christmas 2019 holiday was the last holiday that Torch ran at the Centre, and Amy and I came as volunteers - my eyesight, though poor, is better than most users of the service! - Hannah being with us as an honorary volunteer.

It was a very special time for us as a family. It was Hannah's first Christmas with us, and I had the opportunity to preach each day at the chapel worship that was an integral part of the holiday. The Christian staff, who worked at the centre, were excellent, and showed great warmth and love the guests, who visited the Centre. We all bonded over the week together; and the change in the quests

from when they arrived to when they left was remarkable. Many were very obviously lifted in their mood and confidence through their experience at the Centre. (A worker at a small local railway station had said on another occasion, that he difference could tell the between the guests when they arrived, and when they left. What a testimony!)



We shared gifts, had a sumptuous Christmas dinner, played games. We sang carols, and heard God's word together. We went on coach trips to interesting places. Hannah made a powerful impression, too: though our blind friends could not see her, many, who had little contact with babies otherwise, were moved to hear her little voice, and feel her little touch, or to have her on their laps.

It was a sad week, too. The charity had taken the decision to close the Centre for financial reasons, a decision which we were all very sad about. The excellent staff - I have not come across a more fun and more loving team anywhere else! - would all be made redundant at the end of the week. The guests, for whom these holidays were a lifeline, would be without these precious communal experiences in the future. Amy and I, who had only joined as volunteers a few years ago, were sad, because we felt that the Lord had given us this ministry to do remarkable things with it.

My sadness as I reflect on last year's experience at Torch is amplified, when I think of what has happened to our country since March. The effect on our blind friends, who so need and rely on touch, of the official policy of "keeping your distance" - even from other consenting healthy people! - will be devastating. I cannot think of the suffering which those we ministered to have gone through in the last 9 months, who were lonely before all this happened.

The kind of "immersive" ministry, if you like, that the Centre offered taking people away and immersing them in a Christian experience from waking to sleeping for a whole week - has great potential, and may be especially needful in these times. To model Christian community, and set people in the midst of it, is infectious: you come away changed. I believe that there is a place for something like this in the lives of churches, too, which could be very helpful to our growth in faith, and our relationships with one another.

They are already organised to increase their capacity on Christmas Day and have designed a three course Christmas Menu with turkey and all the trimmings.



Christmas Can't Come Too Early

Every year it happens. I hear Christians lamenting how 'Christmas comes earlier every year.' Since September shops, supermarkets and garden centres have been selling Christmas jumpers, socks and pyjamas and all kinds of other seasonal merchandise. Should we be annoyed or exasperated? Should we have gone around reminding people that it's much too early for tinsel and mistletoe?

This year, of all years, the answer from churches and Christians of all denominations must surely be a resounding 'NO.' As people began looking to Christmas for some light in the gloom of the pandemic - and hard-hit businesses desperately need to increase their income and chances of survival - it sounds a woefully wrong note if the Church is saying 'hold back, it's not time yet...' Because Christmas is that time of year when increasing numbers of people want to come to church services and share in the story of the new-born King. It is when carols are played in shopping centres, and there are openings to speak of the meaning of the season.

Churches might not be able to host big indoor carol services this year, but the challenge is how we take the Christmas message out into the streets and neighbourhoods around our buildings. This year has been one like no other for millions of people, with little prospect of better news into the New Year. So we need to be declaring the Christmas message of hope and light and joy in the


darkness. And to be doing so at every opportunity.

But also, we need to be doing so with sensitivity and care, for the many who will find it hard to be celebrating this pandemic year, and with the prospect of large family gatherings in doubt because of Covid-19 regulations.

Archbishop of York Stephen Cottrell wrote in his 2009 book 'Do Nothing Christmas is Coming', "Christmas is one of the most joyful times of the year. It is also one of the most stressful. It is laden with expectations. It is often overtaken with grief. It might be the season of good will, but it can feel like the last straw on an already overburdened camel." He added ruefully, "Wise men would not ride this one."

Archbishop Cottrell is right that Christmas has to be approached sensitively, that we need to take care in how we celebrate, that for many people who have lost loved ones and livelihoods during this traumatic year, Christmas will not be easy. We come alongside people with the news that the baby born in the manger grew up to be the Man of Sorrows, acquainted with grief, who experienced suffering and bereavement. God, born as Man, who shared our pain as well as our celebrations, ultimately died on a cross to rise again.

Our mission is to bring a message of hope, and to do so with love, humility and sensitivity to a hurting disorientated world – one that's eager for light in the gloom.

Thank you Almighty Father, for sending your Son Jesus to shed light on our way. Amen.



He replied by return: "Cake eaten by mistake."


Next Christmas


