


Letter from the Vicarage...

If you make New Year's resolutions, I wonder what they might be for 2021? For me, one is to get back into running regularly. In the last few months that pattern has become non-existent, so here goes for January!

Many people make New Year resolutions – to cut down on alcohol, eat healthier, go to bed earlier, or get back into reading. Personally, while there is nothing which commands it in the Bible, I think there is something refreshing to begin a New Year with an aim.



Resolutions recognise that there are things about us which aren't quite right. Things which could be better. Be it our weight, our blood pressure or our sleeping habits. For many, New Year is a time to take stock and think what needs to change.

Yet so often we only go so far in our reflections. We think about our bodies (not a bad thing at all) or perhaps little aspects of our character. But we don't often go deeper into our life and being. We only go so far in our solutions – usually amounting to us trying harder in some way.

But what about if alongside the healthier lifestyle or new beneficial habits, something deeper needed to change in our individual lives? In our corporate lives as communities? Something which can't be fixed with a 12 week plan, or a bit more will power.

Our current times point us in that direction.

CS Lewis, the writer of the Narnia books, once wrote in *The Problem of Pain*:

"Pain insists upon being attended to. God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pain: it is His megaphone to rouse a deaf world."

God uses the trials, sufferings, and struggles of life to wake us up to see things are not all okay. When life is simple and easy, we tend to think everything around us is ok. We don't really ask the big questions in life. We don't ponder eternal matters. It is as if we are deaf with how things really are. So deaf that sometimes God needs to shout louder to get out attention. In Lewis' words, that is one thing that suffering does - it is God rousing us to see things need to change.

Our present times are so painful on all sorts of levels. We feel vulnerable in a way most of us have never done. But what if in this time we were being led to see that something needs to change? What if God was seeking to turn this difficulty to something gloriously beneficial in our lives? Using it to wake us to see our problem and his wonderful solution.

Something deeper needs to change in all of us. Deeper than our weight or addictions. It is our very being, which left to itself runs from God, and seeks to run things in place of God. It shows itself in some of the negative patterns in our lives, communities and nations. A resolution will not fix that. But wonderfully God can.

Our current times should wake us to that reality. They stop us thinking there isn't a problem, or that we can fix it.

We access God's wonderful solution through repentance. By recognising the problem before God, turning from it back to him. It sounds negative – but it is the most life-giving act. For '*The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit.*' (Psalm 34:18). It is in that place we find God close, and ever present to help.

So by all means make a New Year resolution in 2021 (and ask me how the running is going!). But don't stop there. As we feel the pain of our present time, hear the voice of our loving creator shouting to you – to us. Make the one change which is needed above all else – returning afresh to the Lord our God.

'Let us examine our ways and test them, and let us return to the Lord.' (Lamentations (3:40)

New Year. Fresh Start

At this time, all of us are having to make different decisions about where and how we interact with people. For some their health means they are not in a place to return physically to church yet. For others, it is because of people we live with, or care for, which means we are having to be very careful. God understands and so do we. We don't want anyone to feel pressure to return if that is not right for them.

But for some of us, it might be that lockdown has just got us out of the pattern of being with God's people on a Sunday. We got in a habit of watching from home earlier last year, and the pattern has just stuck! We are creatures of habit, and they can form fast. For some, maybe we are fearful. Or maybe for others, if we are honest, we've enjoyed the ability to watch at a time or a place which suits us. So, the thought of returning seems harder than staying at home.

Each of us has to discern before God what is right in our present situation. As I say we don't want anyone to feel pressure to return if that is not right for them. But if for you, you know it is really out of a habit that has formed which is keeping you away, not any other reason – why not use the opportunity of the New Year to reconnect in person afresh? You would find a very warm welcome if you did. For those who still can't, we will seek to find as many ways as we can to enable us to relate together, while we are still apart.

Dig Deeper – a great New Year's resolution

The Bible - Just a book for children? Too confusing? Wouldn't know where to start? Not sure I have the time? It may be that you connect with some of those reasons why adults have often never read the Bible.

And yet if the Bible is what it claims to be, then there can be no more important book! Imagine having a letter from the Queen and never reading it. The Bible is a love letter to us from the King of Kings. Why not make 2021 the year to begin to read it for yourself? But how?

Start small

Don't be too adventurous to begin. Take a small number of verses – maybe one story in a gospel – and a manageable time – maybe just 5-10mins. You can always build up, but you are more likely to sustain it.

Make a time

Like all things in life – it will only happen if we make time for it. Why not set aside some minutes when you get up? Or at the end of the day?

Ask for help

God hasn't just given us the Bible, he promises to help us as we read it. It isn't simply a text book to teach us things, but it's designed to change us! Begin each time with a simple prayer to God asking for his help to understand what you are reading and to live out what it means.

Start at the beginning (of the New Testament)

A wise lady once sang 'Let's start at the very beginning, a very good place to start.' With the Bible, the most accessible place to begin is one of the gospels (the eyewitness account of Jesus' life). Mark's gospel is the shortest. Jesus is the heart of the Bible's message and as we understand him the other parts begin to come into focus.

Get help

It can be hard sometimes knowing what parts of the Bible are about. Don't be discouraged. In part, the more we get to know the Bible, the more we understand the parts. But there are also some great things out there to help you. On our website we upload free Bible reading notes to help you as you read. Or why not come to St Paul's and ask your questions!

Ask good questions

As you read ask...What is happening in this part? What has it come before or after? Are there tricky words or ideas I need help with? What does it teach me about God? How does it encourage me to trust Jesus? Are there things to change because of it? What can I give thanks for?

But what if you are not a 'reader'? There are some great audio Bibles to buy, such as the New International Version recorded by David Suchet (Poirot fame!) which means you can listen along to it being read for you.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity: 18th – 25th January

This year's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity has been prepared by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland. The theme, "Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit", is based on John 15:1-17 and expresses Grandchamp Community's vocation to prayer, reconciliation and unity in the Church and the human family. For 2021, the sisters are inviting churches across the world to enter into their tradition of prayer and silence that is rooted in the ancient traditions of the Church catholic.

Today the community has 50 sisters, spanning different generations, Church traditions, countries and continents. In their diversity the sisters are a living parable of communion.

Each year Christian Aid provides the 'Week of Prayer for Christian Unity' with 'Go and Do' action points for each of the daily reflections – linking into the important work of Christian Aid in the relief of poverty and advocacy of justice. Holocaust Memorial Day calls for 'light in the darkness' of today

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY 27/1 It was 25 years ago this month, on 27th January 1996, that the first Holocaust Remembrance Day was observed in Germany. It became International Holocaust Day in 2005 when it was adopted by the United Nations. It marks the day (27th January 1945) when the Auschwitz-Birkenau death camp was liberated.

The theme for Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) in 2021 is '**Be the light in the darkness'**. The aim is to encourage people to "reflect on the depths to which humanity can sink, but also the ways individuals and communities resisted that darkness to 'be the light' before, during and after genocide."

HMD is encouraging people to heed the 'Be the light in the darkness' theme as a call to action. "The utterly unprecedented times through which we are living currently are showing the very best of which humanity is capable but also - in some of the abuse and conspiracy theories being spread on social media - the much darker side of our world as well.

"We can all stand in solidarity. We can choose to '**be the light in the darkness'** in a variety of ways and places – at home, in public, and online."

January 1st ~ The Naming of Jesus

Perhaps this was a question the Wise Men asked after seeing the infant Jesus. They had come from a distant land to Jerusalem. They had followed a star and expected to see a royal child. Now in Bethlehem, they saw things differently. No doubt, Mary and Joseph shared with these men their recent experiences and knew God was with them. Now the Magi had to have eyes of faith to recognise that this child was God in the flesh.

On 6th January many churches will celebrate Epiphany. On this day we remember the Eastern Men bringing their gifts to Jesus. The word 'epiphany' describes their 'revelation' or 'insight' that this was no ordinary baby. Who could they tell? Not King Herod. They had a dream warning them to return home a different way.

Their return to familiar surroundings was going to be different. They couldn't be silent about what they had experienced. Their lives were now changed. On returning home they faced new circumstances and challenges.

Doesn't this sound a bit familiar to us today? The Covid-19 pandemic has affected all of us in one way or another. Where do we go from here? We have celebrated our Lord's birth, but now we are returning to our previous activities. The festive break is over, and we are returning to changed, very difficult circumstances.

We go into a New Year that is so different from this time last year. While we might be downcast with all the upsets around us, there is one thing that has not changed.

It is almighty God! He is our rock. We can look to Him in this world of confusion and uncertainty. Perhaps, from now on, we shall be worshipping and serving Him in different ways. So, with the challenges that lie ahead, let's continually seek His guidance.




The vicar was praying for the sick and said: "We must remember Mrs Goodwin in our prayers. She recently had all her teeth taken out and a new gas stove put in."
