Letter from the Vicarage...

'Why?' I imagine that is a question you will have asked at some point. Maybe as the news unfolds in front of us, you have asked it recently? Often in times of suffering and distress it comes to our lips.

It is a very human question. It recognises the disorientation and confusion which life in this world can bring.



It is not a question the Bible shies away from. In fact

as Jesus died he took upon his lips, words of King David, as he cried 'My God, My God *why* have you forsaken me?' (Matthew 27:46)

Do you notice on the cross, Jesus asks 'Why?' As the eternal Son, he knew his Father's plan. He willingly went to the cross in obedient completion of it. However, for that terrible moment, all that was unknown. He was cut off from all that made sense.

It might seem strange, but that is a great encouragement. In Jesus, God the Son took on our human nature. So in Jesus, there is one who has been where we have been. He knows what it is to face that confusion. We have one who has cried 'Why?'

It gives us confidence to take our 'why's' to him. He is big enough for us to reverently ask him those questions. Rather than run from him, to bring them openly and honestly.

Yet Good Friday not only gives us hope in our 'why's'; it offers us hope beyond them.

We may never know the full answer to our questions. We may have to live with the pain that brings.

However, as Jesus died, and in his human nature was forsaken by God, he was allowing us to be welcomed by God.

The one thing Jesus did not deserve was to be forsaken in divine judgement. Jesus had lived in sweet, obedient union with his Father all his life. It is us whom the Bible says rightly deserve that end. A forsakenness which even the most terrible abandonment in the here and now cannot compare to.

But Jesus willingly carried that upon himself for sinners like you and me. In his death he was making a way to know God. To know a security that the one trusting him will never be forsaken, even in the darkest of days. Making a way to know the God who does know the answers, even if we don't. Making a way so that while we may never know the reasons why there is such suffering in our lives or in the world, we can know one reason it is not.

It's not because he doesn't love us. Jesus' dying and rising shows the love which God has for each of us if we will come to him for it.

A love stronger than our wrong, which would cut us off from him. Stronger than death. It gives us the full life that we were made for, not just now, but eternally.

Good Friday presents to us in Jesus, a God who is strong and loving enough to hold before him our 'why's' and be able to trust him with them. Trust him even when we don't have the full answer.

But it makes a way to know God in those 'why's', and in the world which he will create beyond them. A world where every wrong will be righted. Every pain transformed into something beautiful. Where a welcome by God will bring sense to everything senseless in the here and now.

This Holy Week, for the first time or the fiftieth time, let us draw close to Jesus, the saving, suffering and risen King of Love.



Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday

Canon Paul Hardingham considers the crowds of Jerusalem...

It must have been a dramatic sight on Palm Sunday when Jesus approached Jerusalem to the adulation of the crowds. The Bible tells us that 'A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the

road. The crowds that went ahead of Him and those that followed shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" (Matthew 21:8,9).

But not everyone in Jerusalem welcomed Jesus; in the very next verse we read, *'the whole city was stirred and asked, "Who is this?"* (10). But by the end of the week, the crowds had turned against Jesus and were demanding His crucifixion. (Matthew 27:22).

Why did they turn against Jesus so quickly? Perhaps they were disappointed because He refused to fulfil their expectations in establishing a new political kingdom. Instead, He came to change our hearts and save us from our sins by His death and resurrection. As He said during that week, *'My kingdom is not of this world.'* (John 18:36). This deeply disappointed those who hoped that He would throw out the hated Roman occupiers.

Where would we have been on that first Palm Sunday? Among the disciples who welcomed Him or among the sceptical crowds? It's easy to

judge those who condemned Jesus, but would we have acted differently? We too can be disappointed when Jesus fails to meet our hopes and expectations of Him?

The message of Easter is that God still loves and accepts us, and because of Jesus we can be forgiven. He came for one simple reason: *'For Christ also suffered once for sins...to bring you to God.'* (1 Peter 3:18). May we welcome Jesus afresh into our lives this Eastertime.

Maundy Thursday, Time to Wash Feet

Maundy Thursday is famous for two things. The first is one of the final acts that Jesus did before His death: the washing of His own disciples' feet (see John 13). Jesus washed His disciples' feet for a purpose: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.



In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis'. The word 'mundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command). The ceremony of the 'washing of the feet' of members of the congregation came to be an important part of the liturgy (regular worship) of the medieval church, symbolising the humility of the clergy, in obedience to the example of Christ.

But Thursday was also important because it was on that night that Jesus first introduced the Lord's Supper, or what we nowadays call Holy Communion.

Jesus and His close friends had met in a secret upper room to share the Passover meal together - for the last time. And there Jesus transformed the Passover into the Lord's Supper, saying, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood' as He, the Lamb of God, prepared to die for the sins of the whole world. John's gospel makes it clear that the Last Supper took place the evening BEFORE the regular Passover meal, and that later Jesus died at the same time that the Passover lambs were killed.

Good Fríday, Jesus and the Thíeves on the Cross

Luke's account of the crucifixion (Luke 23:32-43) emphasises the mocking of the crowd, *'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself'* (35,37,39). In their view a Messiah does not hang on a cross and suffer. In considering the two men who were crucified with Jesus, we are also confronted with the issue of how Jesus secures salvation for us.

The words of one of those crucified with Jesus reflected the crowd's taunts: 'Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us.' He highlights the question of Jesus' identity: how can He save others, when He cannot save Himself from death? He failed to see that the cross itself was the means of salvation.

So - what kind of Messiah was Jesus?


The other criminal's response in his last moments is a moving expression of faith. When challenging the other man, he spoke of the utter injustice of the crucifixion: *'this man has done nothing wrong.'* He perceived the truth that Jesus was indeed the Messiah. In a wonderful picture of grace, *'remember me when You come into Your kingdom'*, the second thief confessed his guilt and secured Jesus' forgiveness and mercy.

In reply, Jesus promised the man life from the moment of death; 'Today you will be with Me in paradise.' Jesus used the picture of a walled

garden to help the man understand His promise of protection and security in God's love and acceptance eternally.

Each one of us has to choose how we react to Jesus on the cross. Do we want Him to 'remember' us when He comes into His kingdom, or not? If you were to die tonight, how confident would you be of going to be with Jesus?

'For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God' (1 Peter 3:18).



Why Easter Will Never Go Away

How do you make sense of the Resurrection? Dead men don't rise, so why believe that this particular dead man *did* rise?

At the end of St Luke's gospel we read that: "they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement" (Luke 24:4). This is highly significant. The Gospels do not show us a group of disciples who were in a receptive frame of mind. After the crucifixion, they were in hiding, frightened and scattered. Then suddenly, they came out of hiding and were totally different; excited, joyful. By Pentecost they were confident, with one firm message: 'You crucified Jesus, but God raised Him up!'

How did they know this? Because of direct personal experience. Some of them had visited the tomb of Jesus: it was empty. Others claimed to have seen and touched the risen Lord. Were they hallucinating? People can hallucinate in groups – when taking drugs, for example. But of course, each one will see a different hallucination. But the disciples all saw the same thing. Or rather, the same person. Jesus.

Were they lying? Jesus had died a humiliating death as a criminal. Perhaps they wanted to rescue His good name. So, did they pretend they had seen Him?

This theory has a big problem. Their preaching led them into trouble with the authorities. They were beaten and imprisoned and some of them killed. People will die for ideas and causes which they believe in passionately. But not for things they have made up. We might suffer for our convictions, but we will not suffer for our inventions.

What about the 'swoon' theory? That Jesus didn't die on the cross, despite terrible wounds? That He recovered in the tomb, and then escaped? That the disciples nursed Him back to health? But Roman soldiers knew when a man was dead; and there was the guard on the tomb. Also, the events which followed simply don't fit. If the disciples had been hiding Jesus all along, they would have kept very low-key, and out of the way, so that the authorities did not come after Him again.

Besides, to preach that God had raised Jesus from the dead – which is exactly what they did preach – would have been a lie. Beatings and threat of death would soon have loosened their tongues. Inventions crumble under pressure; convictions hold fast.

Another reason for believing in the Resurrection is this: Jesus' continuing impact. Thousands and soon millions of people in every generation since have shared an inescapable sense of being 'accompanied' through life. Though unseen, they identify this presence as the Risen Lord.

Sometimes this experience of meeting Jesus is gentle and fitful. Sometimes it is dramatic and life changing. This reminds us that the resurrection of Jesus is not just an interesting historical puzzle. It is a vital, present day reality. It brings wonderful comfort, assuring us of the central Christian truths: death is dead; Jesus is alive; God is love.

This central notion was captured, most movingly, by the great Albert Schweitzer: 'He came to those men who knew Him not. He speaks to us the same word: "Follow thou me," and sets us to the tasks which He has to fulfil for our time. He commands. And to those who obey Him, whether they be wise or simple, He will reveal Himself in the toils, the conflicts, the suffering which they shall pass through in His fellowship, and, as ineffable mystery, they shall learn in their own experience who He is.'

Have a joyful - and a challenging - Easter.

The War in Ukraine

How should we respond to the situation in Ukraine? As we see the terrible situation in Ukraine unfold, we will be filled with many emotions. Here are some things God's word draws our attention to:

Lament

Lament is a passionate expression of grief. It is an emotion expressed throughout the Scriptures in the face of suffering and sin. It is right to mourn the violence being inflicted in Ukraine. It is good and right that we feel a sense of outrage in the face of the injustice of the invasion, and the suffering which flows from it. We express that lament to God and ask him to restrain evil.

Compassion

When Jesus saw people in need, his heart went out to them. The hungry crowd, lost from God, were met with his compassion. His greatest love was to die to save those people. But Jesus cared about their physical and emotional needs too. He fed them. We should feel compassion, like him, to those made in the image of God, hurting and in fear and distress. That compassion will flow out in prayer, giving, and for some, in welcoming the stranger into our community and home. Do pray for Christians in the region seeking to reach out in compassion. Some ways we might be involved are on pages 13 and 14. Our heart is also to be soft, rather than hardened, to the Russian people too.

Return

In Luke 13, Jesus calls us when we see tragedy in our world to wake-up and repent. It is an opportunity not simply to lament the actions of other nations and pray for radical change in Russia's leaders. But also to return to the Lord ourselves. To search if there are ways in which our dealings with others as a nation over the decades have compounded the current situation, or where we have wronged others, and to seek mercy. To return to the Lord as the one who is the source of our security as a nation. Not to take it, or Him for granted. Return to the Lord where we see the seeds of war in our own hearts. One Hungarian pastor working on the border supporting refugees, as well as asking for prayer for their humanitarian work, put it this was 'pray also for the world to wake up from her godlessness since, to a degree, we are all responsible for what is unfolding before our eyes.'

Trust

We don't know what lies ahead in Ukraine, the surrounding region, or indeed our world. That brings distress and fear. Is God in control? Is he still good? In the face of this we renew our trust in God who does not change like shifting shadows. Though we cannot fathom it, God is as on the throne as he was before this war began, and as he was on the day Jesus died. He is just as good today as he was then. We may feel more powerless in recent days. But that only highlights that we have never been in control. Yet wonderfully our God still is.

Witness

A minister in Ukraine recently said 'In dark places, God sends his children to be light'. We cry for the salvation of people in Ukraine, Russia and the surrounding region. Christians in those countries are having opportunities to provide for needs, to pray for people and share Jesus. The Bible Society report an increase in requests for Bibles in Ukraine. But there is an opportunity to witness here too. In the past 2 years we have experienced the frailty of life when faced with a pandemic. This situation raises that as well. Yet we know the one who brings sense to an often senseless world, life in the face of death, and the promise of a world where wrongs will be righted and wars ceased, for any who come to him. So we seek to share Him.

Prayers across Europe for Peace in Ukraine

Bishop Robert Innes, Bishop in Europe, has been to Ukraine many times, as the Anglican church has a chaplaincy in Kiev. Here he calls on Christians in the UK and across Europe to pray for their brothers and sisters in Ukraine.



He writes:

"Our little church in Kyiv are right at the centre of this crisis," he explained. "Some of them have fled the city by car, others are still there. These are our people, our brothers and sisters, and of course we are very concerned for their wellbeing and safety.

"In the face of military action and aggression, we feel powerless. What can we do? One thing that we can all do is pray."

"The situation in Ukraine is very deeply troubling. President Putin is leading a completely unjustified and aggressive war against Ukraine, a war which many ordinary Russians deeply deplore.

Leaders from many Christian churches, including the Ukrainian Orthodox (Russian Patriarchate) Church have condemned the invasion of Ukraine. Our hearts cry out for justice and peace. We are most especially concerned for the wellbeing of those in Ukraine who are directly affected by the war.

This includes particularly the members of our own congregation of Christ Church, Kyiv. The Churchwarden there, Christina, messaged us this morning saying: 'Please pray for us as we are standing here for our land and for our roots. The battle for Kyiv has begun; it is fierce and intensive. Pray for us.'

In the face of military action, we can easily feel powerless and fearful. But one thing we can do is pray. We can pray in solidarity with those most affected. We can pray that God will yet overrule in the hearts and minds of those with power and authority. We can pray that the victims will be few and that the innocent will be protected. We can pray that peace will come through justice and not through the infliction of the will of a stronger party on a weaker.

Praying for the Peace of the World

Almighty God,

from whom all thoughts of truth and peace proceed: kindle, we pray, in the hearts of all, the true love of peace and guide with your pure and peaceable wisdom those who take counsel for the nations of the earth that in tranquillity your kingdom may go forward, till the earth is filled with the knowledge of your love; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.







About 5 minutes later the same gentleman came back into the shop having seen a disability walker in the window and asked me to get it out for him because he thought it would be useful for his wife who couldn't walk very well and said he was her carer.

The gentleman took it to the counter and then another younger man at the back of the shop got his wallet out and gave me £10 to give to the gentleman to buy the walker. I asked if they knew each other and he said no, he just wanted to buy it for him. The elderly man was both astonished and delighted at the kindness shown by the younger man. He went over to thank him and they exchanged names and had a chat about how difficult it is to look after a disabled family member.

It was such a heart-warming random act of kindness.
