Letter from the Vicarage...

'You have just got to have faith.' Faith is a key Bible word. It is at the heart of the Christian faith. But what does it mean? What does it look like?

Is it a leap in the dark? A trust lacking evidence? Wishful thinking? Or something else?

This half term we are going to unpack that question a little more as we meet a man and his family whom the Bible declares is the 'father' of all those of faith. Christians walk in the footsteps of his faith. We live the benefits of his faith.

His name is Abraham. He lived a long time ago. A long way from here. He was far from perfect. His life was far from easy. Yet he followed the faithful Lord, and put his trust in him. His life was a life of faith. His story in the Scriptures, as it points us to the Lord who can be trusted, should help us understand more of what it looks like for us to live by faith.

I don't know if you followed the story of Max Woosey. He is a 12 year old boy who slept in a tent in his back garden for two years to raise money for charity. It was an impressive feat.

To live in a tent is to live somewhere temporary. It is to recognise your situation is not permanent. The writer to the Hebrews declares that of Abraham:

"By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God." (Hebrews 11:9-10)

Abraham moved from his homeland to a foreign land at the command and promise of God. But though this land would belong to his descendants, Abraham didn't settle down.

He lived in tents. His faith in the Lord extended beyond what he could see – the dust and soil promised to his family line. He knew his true home was in heaven, a new creation. He lived in tents waiting that more secure, permanent, lasting home of God.

Whether you would say you are a person of faith in Jesus or not, you are really welcome to join us this half term as we seek to see what faith in Jesus looks like in practice. May it lead us to be like Abraham – live in this world now with our eyes fixed on a lasting home to come for God's people.

Report on Annual Parochial Church Meeting 2022

The Parishioner's Meeting began by passing a resolution to allow Church Wardens to extend their terms of service by one year beyond their maximum term. Pam Rowell and Alan Curtis were elected as churchwardens again, with Pam Rowell serving in her seventh year.

The Annual Church Meeting received the Annual Report and Church Finances, previously circulated. Reports on the buildings, the work of the PCC and Deanery Synod were presented. Stephen Whittaker gave a verbal report on safeguarding, including updating us on the changes to criminal records checks and renewal lengths. The revised Electoral roll saw nine new members join, with four removed. The Electoral Roll stands at 107 members. None of the Deanery Synod representative vacancies were filled. Three new members were elected to the PCC – Judith Fenton, Anne Scanes and Jennifer Sealey. Sides persons who help with the important ministry of welcome were re-elected.

In the Vicar's report, Paul drew attention to the unchanging nature of God – a comfort and anchor in a year of change. He brought to the meeting's attention some of the changes at St Paul's in the past year including people and patterns of services. It was acknowledged these included much joy. But some have also been difficult. Paul highlighted that some of the teaching we have covered has been hard. It is God's good word to us, given in love. But recognising and hearing it has not always been easy.

Paul shared a number of exciting encouragements from 2021, and highlighted a number of priorities for 2022:

Establish - Having begun a new pattern of services, it will be important to seek to establish those patterns. With all things new or different, reflection and review is needed to consider ways they can be further strengthened.

Sustain - With new ministries beginning, and existing ministries continuing, it is important to consider how they will be sustained in the longer term particularly through the identifying and training of leaders.

Outreach - The foundation from which to grow as a disciple-making church is our own growth as disciples. From this, it is important we continue to discern ways to make connections with our community, where opportunities to serve people in the name of Christ might be, with the great desire of identifying further ways to speak of Jesus. The Holiday Club is an upcoming example.

Fellowship – With time apart and changes in our congregation, building relationships is vital. To this end, a Link Up Lunch is planned for 15th May; and a Church Away Day in July.

Finances - While we give great thanks to God for his provision through his people and other means in 2021, closing the gap between our current financial situation and providing for our needs, ourselves, must be our aim in the next few years. While there have been encouragements, we continue to be in a sobering financial position.

Fabric - There are pressing works needed on the church hall roof. Work is under way to seek to address these.

Paul summed up the report reminding the church of its identity and vision statement, leaving the question, 'what is the Lord going to do in the next year?'

'I, the Lord do not change. So you, the descendants of Jacob, are not destroyed.' Mal 3:6

The Ascension

Canon Paul Hardingham considers where Jesus is now.

This month at Ascension Day, we remember Jesus ascending to 'God's right hand' (1 Peter 3:22). It's a somewhat neglected Christian festival, taking place on a Thursday, 40 days after Easter. However, this phrase is used in three different contexts in the New Testament.

Sitting at God's right hand

Jesus occupies a position of power and authority at the centre of the universe, 'exalted to the right hand of God' (Acts 2:33). This position was secured by His death and resurrection, enabling us to experience the life of heaven, including eternal life, forgiveness, healing and the power to transform lives and communities. Is this our expectation and experience?

Standing at God's right hand

Our experience of heaven is only partial because of the presence of suffering and disappointment in our lives. Stephen, the first Christian martyr, saw Jesus 'standing at the right hand of God' (Acts 7:56), when being stoned to death. Do we see that Jesus is on the throne and has a purpose for our lives, even when we are going through setbacks and difficulties? As a result of Stephen's death, the church grew and the apostle Paul was impacted. Where do we see the fruit of the suffering in our lives?

Praying at God's right hand

Finally, we are told that Jesus is 'interceding for us' at God's right hand (Romans 8:34 & Hebrews 7:25). Jesus is on our side at the heart of the universe and fully knows our needs when praying for us. He is for us, even when we feel defeated by the wrong things in our lives. How does this help us now?

So where has Jesus gone? Because He is in heaven, the Ascension opens up the possibility that we can experience the life of heaven, both now and in eternity.

The Meaning of Colours ~ Part 1

In March, April and May this year the coloured frontal of the altar will have been changed many times. Each colour – and there can be as many as six in a church's store – has a different meaning. They reflect the significance of that day or the season.

In March, purple was used as a symbol of penitence, as we were in Lent and trying to prepare ourselves for Christ's final act of love for each of us.

Holy Week – the time of Christ's final journey – was denoted by the colour red. Red, the colour of blood, is used for feasts of martyrs as well as those for the Holy Spirit – when it more likely represents his flames of 'fire' which rested on those in the Upper Room.

Maundy Thursday, we switched to white for Communion services, as this celebrates the remembrance of the first Communion with His apostles, which He commanded us to continue.

On Good Friday, we were back to red, although in some churches, the altar remains uncovered.

Then on Easter Sunday, the day of the greatest Christian Celebration, we entered to an altar bedecked in gold or the 'whitest' with the most elaborate decoration, the church possesses.

'Plain' White will be used for the Easter Season signifying purity and Christ's triumph over death until Ascension Day on Thursday 26th May. This, being a special and more significant day in the life, death and resurrection of Christ, goes to gold again: then immediately back to white for the next ten days.

On the day of Pentecost itself, Whit Sunday, 5th June, the colour will be red, representing the flames of fire.

Throughout the year the changing colours indicate the special meanings that a particular day, or season, has in the life of the church. In June it will all change again, so we'll consider those next month.

War in Ukraine: Appeal for more Bibles

Bible Society is appealing for funds to send more Bibles to Ukraine. It says that Christians in the UK "can speak hope" into the crisis by providing Ukrainian pastors and churches with more Bibles with which to share "the love and power of God's Word."

Oleksandr, who leads the Bible Society team in Ukraine, tells the story: "A few days ago, a pastor visited our office, asking for Bibles. When he heard that we had none left, he pleaded for Bibles that were damaged or even copies with pages missing. He said, 'These Bibles would be of immense value to my congregation and the community!' It was heartbreaking.

"God's Word can help bring comfort, peace, and reconciliation to our nation. We long for more Bibles."

Just one in a crowd, I stand and I wait.


Waiting for what? The future's unclear, For armed men have taken all that I held dear Along with my hopes, and all I had planned All swept away by the tanks in my land.


