Letter from the Vicarage...

Seventy years is a long time. Seventy years as Queen means that Queen Elizabeth II is currently the longest reigning monarch alive. The third longest reigning in world history. There is a rightness in thanking God for her reign, and indeed its longevity, as we approach the Platinum Jubilee.

During those seventy years, empires have come to an end, wars have been fought, huge social changes have taken place, and humanity has



reached the moon and plumbed the depths of the ocean. The means of the Queen communicating has gone from a radio broadcast on her 21st birthday, through to 'Zoom' meetings with people around the world since her health has declined. In that time there have been significant, and often sad, changes in her own family too.

Yet for all that change, she has remained a constant. In fact, for many of us alive, she has been the only monarch we have lived under. But in that time, 15 different Prime Ministers have served in her governments, 170 leaders across the commonwealth.

There is something about our national life, as a constitutional monarchy, with a hereditary monarch, set alongside an elected government, which is humbling, and almost parabolic. As politicians come and go over time, different policies or different parties, elected at the will of the people, the Queen has remained a fixed point. Her authority comes not from within – by election – but from without. She holds in herself a repository of experience in national life, which no one politician has. Her fixed presence a reminder to ourselves and those who serve under her, that our power is limited, our existence is fragile. It should lead us to humility, and to recognise that what is needed in the ever changing reality of life is an authority and a fixed point from without, rather than simply within.

But of course, while we celebrate the Jubilee, we also sadly recognise a time will eventually come, when even our own Queen will no longer be our monarch. Even her power is limited and time bound.

Which means this Platinum Jubilee, as well as giving thanks for Queen Elizabeth's reign, and continuing to pray for he, we must look through her and beyond her. To the King who never changes. To the King whose authority is not established by us, but we are established by him.

Moses writes in Ps 90:

Lord, you have been our dwelling place throughout all generations.

Before the mountains were born or you brought forth the whole world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.

Here is the eternal Monarch – creator and sustainer – that deep down we long for. That we most need. The one to find security and a fixed point in, in life and death.

So this June as we celebrate, and as we think much about our Queen, let her longevity in the face of a changing world, point us beyond to the everlasting to everlasting King.

Her need of God

'I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong. But I shall not have strength to carry out this resolution alone unless you join it with me, as I now invite you to do: I know that your support will be unfailingly given. God help me to



make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share it.' (21st birthday radio address, 1947)

Our accountability before God

For me the teachings of Christ and my own personal accountability before God provide a framework in which I try to lead my life. I, like so many of you, have drawn great comfort in difficult times from Christ's words and example.

Jesus the guide

I know just how much I rely on my own faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning, I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God. Jesus the needed Saviour

What Kind of Queen?

The Ven John Barton considers a much-loved Queen.

Traditional images of monarchy portray power, status, and superiority over other people. In biblical times, monarchs were to be feared. When teaching His disciples about leadership, Jesus said, "The kings of the Gentiles (pagans) lord it over them; and those in authority over them are called



benefactors." A benefactor was a conspicuously generous person who acted in a way that made the recipient feel obligated.

All this was in complete contrast to Christ's own style, which was to act like a servant. This radical stance was adopted by the young Princess Elizabeth, when she promised the British Commonwealth, "I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service ...". It was just the same when she became Queen in 1952. Queen Elizabeth has consciously and deliberately applied Christ's teaching to her reign for 70 years. She has outlived scores of leaders, some with ambitions beyond their abilities, and a few with delusions of grandeur. Her ideals have outlasted theirs. Consistent, determined, charming, and single-minded, she has held before her the model of Christ, washing His disciples' feet.

Those closest to her also speak of the Queen's sense of humour. It emerged publicly at the opening ceremony of the 2012 Olympic Games in London, when she took part in a spoof scene with James Bond, before seemingly parachuting into the Stadium.

This year we celebrate her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. Over 50 countries will light beacons on 2nd June to start four days of events: a spectacular pageant, a live concert at Buckingham Palace, Jubilee lunches and street parties across the nation, plus a nationwide bake-off competition to create a new 'platinum pudding'.

From the northernmost tip of Scotland to the Channel Islands and beyond, 848 public events are planned, plus 1,171 parties or private events.

So popular is Britain's monarch, that there are calls to perpetuate the occasion with a new public holiday each year. This month we shall sing, 'God save the Queen' with more gusto than ever.

Pentecost in Jerusalem Sunday 5th June 2022

On that long ago first morning of Pentecost, Jerusalem was crowded with thousands of visitors, for it was one of the most popular feast-days in the Jewish calendar – the Feast of First Fruits, looking forward to the wheat harvest.

In one small room of that great city, a small group of people who had followed Jesus were praying.

There was nothing else for them to do: Jesus had died, He had risen, and He had ascended, promising to send them 'a Comforter'. They were left alone, to wait at Jerusalem. And so they waited – on Him, and for Him.

They were not disappointed, for that morning the Holy Spirit fell upon that small room, and transformed those believers into the Church, Christ's body here on earth. Pentecost was not the first time that the Holy Spirit came to the world – throughout the Old Testament there

are stories telling of how God had guided people and given them strength. But now His Spirit would use a new instrument: not just isolated prophets, but the Church, His body on earth.

Acts opens with the preaching of the gospel in Jerusalem, the centre of the Jewish nation. Within 30 years the Gospel had spread throughout the northern Mediterranean: Syria, Turkey, Greece, Malta... to the very heart of the Roman Empire: Rome. The Church was on the move – God was on the move! He was calling people from every nation to repent, turn to Jesus for forgiveness of their sins, and to follow Him.

Trinity Sunday, Celebrating Our God Who is Three Persons Sunday 12th June 2022

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in

space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are *of* the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.'

Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.'

Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...'

Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that warmth and life are there as well.

The Meaning of Colours Pt 2

Last month we looked at the changing of colours in the church's vestments and altar cloths during March, April and May this year. This month of June sees them changing again, but this time for around 20 weeks.

We start the month still in the season of Easter; strictly speaking, in the time after the Ascension. The first Sunday in June is the feast of Pentecost. This was and remains a Jewish Festival. At the time of Jesus, it was a joyful celebration of the first fruits of the Harvest, which was why all the apostles were gathered together in Jerusalem, as was expected of all Jewish men.

As they gathered following Jesus' Ascension, the Holy Spirit came upon them. This is what Christians celebrate at Pentecost, and therefore the colour is red. The following day the colour changes to green, and remains green until the 30th of October, the Feast of All Saints' which will be white.

This gives us approximately 20 weeks of 'green' with the occasional day in between of white or red to celebrate an apostle, saint or a specific feast day. So the question is 'Why?' Why so long?

This time is often referred to as 'Ordinary' time. So what is 'ordinary' about it? I don't know about your life but mine tends to go along fairly steady with just the odd up or down time. Most of my days are 'ordinary'.

In church lectionary terms this period of 'X Sunday after Pentecost' follows one main gospel's teachings and miracles of Jesus. It's almost like He gathers us together for a summer school and takes us up a

mountainside and teaches us there. It's a time for leaning and growth.



Like the green grass feeds the animals, this month spend some time just looking at a patch of grass or the leaves on trees from a distance.

See the different shades and hues and when you next hear the gospel reading imagine sitting under those trees on that grass with Jesus Himself.



Ukraine

As we continue to pray for peace between Ukraine and Russia; that the Lord may be merciful and cut short these days of suffering, conflict and displacement, it is becoming apparent that unfortunately, other issues around the world are being overlooked.



Starving in the Shadow of Ukraine

The huge outpouring of support for Ukraine is now eclipsing other crises around the world, which in turn is threatening millions with starvation.

So warns a number of charities and other humanitarian organisations. The UN reports that the situation in Somalia, where 4.5milliion people are at risk of starvation owing to the worst drought in a decade, is deteriorating quickly. Somalia urgently needs some £1.1billion in aid, of which only three per cent has been secured.

As one spokesman at the UN explains, "The outlook for Somalia was already grim prior to the outbreak of the Ukraine crisis, but we were then overshadowed by the crisis in Tigray, Yemen, and then Afghanistan. Now, Ukraine seems to suck all the oxygen that is in the room."

The international director of Tearfund, Veena O'Sullivan, said: "While the eyes of the world have been fixed on Ukraine, other horrors have been taking place."

These range from a "hunger crisis of massive proportions" in the Horn of Africa, which includes Somalia, and the ongoing violence and famine in the Tigray region of Ethiopia, as well as humanitarian crises in Afghanistan, Yemen and Syria.

The director of CAFOD, Christine Allen, said: "It is right that we support a response to the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine, in whatever way we can, but this cannot be at the expense of vital funds meant for tackling the root causes of global poverty."

Meanwhile, church leaders in Africa have warned that the war is already affecting their food security, as 40 per cent of Ukraine's wheat and maize is exported to the Middle East and Africa. The poorest are the most affected, as market prices rise.


With all the anxiety around at the moment, Psalm 143 is helpful when it comes to seeking God in prayer. It literally is a cry to God to 'incline His ear to us'...




