

Letter from the Vicarage...

The middle of July marks the formal end of Bishop Julian's leadership of us in Blackburn Diocese, having served for nine years as Diocesan Bishop. His Farewell Communion is on July 16th at Blackburn Cathedral. He will formally retire at the end of August following the Lambeth Conference.

Of course, we do not put 'our trust in princes, in human beings...' (or Bishops) (Psalm 146:3), rather our trust is to be in the Lord.



However, I am thankful to the Lord for his use of Julian and Heather, Julian's wife, during their time amongst us. Julian has been a personal encouragement to me, and supportive of the work of St Paul's. Some may remember his visit in 2016, or Heather's 'From Borneo to Bishop's House' testimony evening, where she shared about Jesus' work in her own life.

I am most thankful that Bishop Julian has sought to open up the Scriptures in our Diocesan life, and spur us on to found our life together upon God's word. I pray that this will be a legacy beyond his time with us. I am thankful too for Julian's willingness to speak for the goodness of God's ways on the national stage, which has not always been easy for him.

Vision 2026, our Diocesan Vision, came into being during his tenure. It seeks to see 'healthy churches transforming communities' by:

- Making disciples of Jesus Christ
- Being witnesses to Jesus Christ
- Growing leaders for Jesus Christ
- Inspiring Children and Young People to raise up a new generation for Christ.

Julian has always wanted this to be a Diocesan Vision rather than simply 'his' vision. One of my prayers is that as the Diocese steps into a new stage, these four elements will remain and grow.

We want to see Christians across Lancashire growing to be mature disciples of Jesus, well grounded in the Bible, passionate in prayer, and giving of their time, talents and resources for him. We want to see Lancashire reached for Jesus so that men, women, boys and girls come to hear his good news and find life under his kingship. We want to see people equipped to serve him in the different areas he has placed them, and particularly our younger generation raised up for Christ. What we want for Lancashire, we want for St Paul's. Please be praying that in God's mercy we would see growth in all these in our own church life.

Please pray for Julian and Heather as they enter retirement, and particularly support their wider family. Pray for Bishop Julian to finish well in his time amongst us, and make the most of every opportunity for Jesus in this last month. Pray for Bishop Philip stepping up as Acting Diocesan Bishop in the vacancy and Bishop Jill as she supports. Please pray for the Lord's hand over the discernment process for our next Bishop - that God would raise up a faithful under-shepherd to shepherd the flock here in Lancashire.

Please pray for the Diocese in this next stage, that the Lord would:

"...revive us again, that your people may rejoice in you..." (Psalm 85:6-7)

Archbishop's 'Joyous and Exciting' Visit



The Archbishop of York, The Most Reverend and Right Honourable Stephen Cottrell, has completed a wonderful long weekend of mission and ministry in our Diocese, visiting many parts of the County across three days.

His journey across the Diocese took him to Burnley, Whalley, Blackburn,

Lancaster and the Fylde Coast, including Blackpool Pleasure Beach Globe Arena for an evangelistic mission evening on Saturday night.

It was during the mission evening that Archbishop Stephen told the story of his own journey to faith and in particular, of a sermon that he heard one day, where he felt the preacher was speaking directly to him, directly from God.

The Archbishop said: "I remember the challenge of his words, that this God was real. And not only was this God real but I only had one life and this life wasn't a dress rehearsal for the real thing; this was the life that I had been given and what was I going to do with my life? I became a follower of Jesus."

Bishop Julian had been anticipating a



'joyous and exciting' visit, which is what it proved to be; and as his visit was drawing to a close, Archbishop Stephen said: "I have had a fantastic weekend in Lancashire – there is much to celebrate and give thanks for. Thank you to everyone involved. My prayer going forward is that we are confident in sharing our faith with others so that more may now the love of God and enter into a relationship with him."

Church A way Day

Saturday 9th July

Coming up this July is our first (at least in recent years) Church Away Day. If you consider yourself a part of the St Paul's church family, can I encourage you to consider coming?



It will be taking place on Saturday 9th July from 9.30am (for 10am start) until 3.15pm, at Christ Church Thornton.

It is an opportunity for us to take time away together to get to know God better in His Word, and to get to know each other better as we share time, food, fun and fellowship.

It is for anyone in the church family – young or old. We hope to have some form of provision for children during the morning sessions. It is for you, whether we have been at St Paul's for many years, or you are relatively new.

There will be two morning sessions, which will include some singing, and Bible talks. The Revd. Alan Hogarth, vicar of Withnell and Heapey (near Chorley) will be our speaker. Alan is originally from Preston and has served in various parishes across the country, including as a part time Army chaplain. Alan will share some of his story, and open up God's word in our two sessions, helping us to understand some of the good news from the New Testament letter, 1 John. The day will conclude with a final shorter concluding service.

But there will be opportunity for refreshment breaks, a meal together in the middle of the day, and free time in the afternoon to use to enjoy being with each other.

Sea Sunday ~ 10th July by Canon Paul Hardingham

Over many years the 2nd Sunday of July has been kept as Sea Sunday, with a special focus on prayer for all seafarers. The Mission to Seafarers supports the work of sailors facing difficult waters, piracy, and separation from loved ones for long periods at sea. However, we can also experience storms in our own lives.

In Acts 27 we read how Paul was being taken as a prisoner to Rome, when he was caught in a storm off Crete. After 14 days they were shipwrecked on the island of Malta. Paul had warned the crew that it wasn't a safe time of year to sail: *"I can see that our voyage is going to be disastrous and bring great loss to ship and cargo, and to our own lives."* But his words were ignored, and the ship sailed into a violent storm.

By the third day they *'finally gave up all hope of being saved'*. How do we face up to storms in our lives? Do we worry and panic? God doesn't necessarily prevent storms from taking place, but we can trust His purpose through them.

Paul urged the sailors to "keep courage, because not one of you will be lost, only the ship will be destroyed". His confidence rested on an angelic promise: "Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you." Only the sovereign God, who created the wind and waves, can promise to save people from a storm. What does this mean for us in our circumstances today?

Why Do We Have a Special Sunday for Seafarers?

Look around your home. How much of the contents in your cupboards, wardrobe, rooms, and even garage came to you over the seas, via the great merchant ships? What would your home be like without them?



Yet when did you last give a thought to the people who bring them to you?

It is a curious fact that seafarers are one of the most important, and yet invisible, people groups in our society. We all of us depend on them to fill our homes and businesses with an endless variety of goods, and yet we never see them, never speak to them, and rarely even remember their existence.

It suddenly makes Sea Sunday seem good sense: an annual opportunity to give thanks for the seafarers of the world, and to pray for their personal well-being. For going to sea is a lonely occupation. It separates families for months on end. It can sometimes be dangerous, and it is always physically demanding work.

So this month, on Sea Sunday, let's pause and give thanks to God for the seafarers of the world. Let's remember how their work so enriches our lives. Let's pray for them, for their families, and let's support the organisations that offer them care and support through their chaplaincy work.

In doing so, we will join with thousands of other Christians, from London to Lagos, Manila to Melbourne and Durban to Dunkerque, who each year remember the seafarers who make our prosperity possible.

A Sermon in Sand The Revd Richard Higginbottom looks at the seashore.

If you are fortunate enough to get to the seaside this summer, then you might like to wriggle your toes in the warm sand, and consider the following:





It has been said that there are more stars in the universe than there are grains of sand on all the beaches in the world. More recently, as the estimated number of stars has increased, then even the grains of sand in all the world's deserts have been added to the comparison!

The Sun, vast though it is, is a fairly ordinary star, 93 million miles away. It is not easy to grasp that sort of a distance, but here's a measuring stick: if you were to fly in a fast passenger jet at 600 miles per hour, then it would take you about 17 hours to fly from London to Sydney; about 17 days to reach the Moon, and about 17 years to reach the Sun!

As for how long it would take to fly on to the next nearest star to us - Proxima Centauri - it would take about 4.2 light years, as the distance is more than 24 trillion miles! And that is just to the next nearest star after the Sun.




How many stars are there in the Universe? Astronomers recently estimated that there are about 70,000 million, million, million stars.



As you sit there you might care to pick up a couple of grains of sand. Let the first grain represent our Sun, the second grain the next nearest star to us. Then look at the whole beach and after that consider <u>all</u> the beaches on Earth, with every grain of sand representing a star then it gives some meaning to the phrase "God the Father *Almighty*, Maker of heaven and earth."



Whoever said "Out of sight, out of mind" never had a large spider disappear in the bedroom.



Cathedrals Have a Mission to Show the 'Heart of Jesus'

The Archbishop of York has encouraged cathedrals to continue to ask the 'hard missional questions' about how to transmit the gospel in the world of today.

Archbishop Stephen Cottrell said cathedrals had a mission to show the 'heart of Jesus' in world of "so much hurt and so much confusion and so much uncertainty."

He said: "Our primary vocation is to be the place that serves and teaches... to show the heart of Jesus to others both from our teaching and preaching and evangelising and through the service that we offer," he said.

The Archbishop urged cathedrals to see themselves as a 'work in progress' when it comes to transmitting the Christian faith. Drawing a parallel with the stonemasons yard tour of York Minster, which allows visitors to see stonemasons at work, he said: "What that tells me very, very clearly is this building is a work in progress – it also tells me something else, hugely important, which is that in order for York Minster to be itself, it has to constantly change."
