

Letter from the Vicarage...

I don't know if you played any party games over Christmas? One which used to be a family favourite of ours was the 'Hat Game'. The paper crowns from the Christmas crackers would be repurposed, and a different famous person's name be written on them. The players would have a hat placed on their head, without seeing the name. They then had twenty attempts asking only 'Yes/No' questions to work out who they were. Usually hilarity followed. My Nan was



almost always 'The Queen', and almost never remembered from the year before, that is who she would be given!

'Who am I?' That is not only an important question to ask ourselves as individuals, but also as a church. Wonderfully, it is not a question without an answer, nor a one where we have to forge an answer for ourselves. Our identity, as those made by God, and as Christians, bought by him, wonderfully comes from him. Life is found living out whom God has made us to be.

God also tells us who we are as a church. Around four years ago, with the church council, and followed by church vision sessions, we sought to discern from the Bible who God says we are to be. Our identity statement was born from this – what we long, and are called to be:

'By God's grace, we are a loving family, of whole hearted disciples, making more disciples.'

In those past four years, there have been changes in our world, our congregational life and indeed our congregation. So with the beginning of the New Year, with the fresh starts it brings, it felt right to look at them together again. In particular, we will be looking at each of the marks on a different Sunday in the earlier weeks of 2023. Of course, our identity doesn't change with a New Year, or the changes of the past years. But it is good to reminded again and again. I trust it will be a refreshing and helpful opportunity, whether you were part of St Paul's when we sought to discern this identity in the past, or it is new to you.

Our memory verse for 2023 (which you can see on page 5) picks up on the first two marks, 'by God's grace' and 'a loving family'. Do pick up a motto text from St Paul's and put it somewhere you can see through the year.

As you do, ponder on the grace of God – that despite our weak love or lack of love for him, his underserved love is lavished towards us. A love which gives us what we most need, as great cost – our sins forgiven though Jesus. That is love, 'vast, unmeasured, boundless, free' to quote a hymn.

Then ponder that if we have received that love, what it looks like to live that kind of love towards one another – sacrificial, costly, generous, and holy, towards each other as a church family.

Pray that we would grow to know, depend on and live in God's grace more and more this year, and as we do, these four marks would show themselves in us more and more.

A Parish Placement

For three weeks in January, I will be on a parish placement at St John's Church in Blackpool. This is part of my curate training.

It was decided that St John's would become something called an "HTB resourcing church." "HTB" is a network

of churches spread across the country, with its own approach to theology, worship, and discipleship. The aim of the placement is to observe something different, and learn from the experience.

This means I won't be at St Paul's - on Sunday mornings and for most of the week - until the end of the placement on 30 January. I will however continue to pray for you all, and will be contactable either over email or by phone or text, so please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Please pray that the Lord would show me helpful things and teach me, while I am on the placement.

What is an HTB Resourcing Church?

HTB is short for Holy Trinity, Brompton, which, to quote from their website, is ".. a vibrant Church of England church in the heart of London, passionate about seeing lives changed in the name of Jesus."

To many, Holy Trinity, Brompton is more familiar as the place where the Alpha Course originated in 1997, which has grown into a global ministry running in 169 countries.

Since 1985, HTB has initiated more than 20 church plants, including St Paul's Hammersmith, St Paul's Shadwell and St Peter's Brighton. To help build on this momentum of church planting in strategic cities across the UK, the Church Revitalisation Trust (CRT) was established in 2017.

Partnered with Church of England dioceses, the CRT is a catalyst for church planting that will see 100 Resource Churches and hundreds of other churches and sites planted and revitalised in strategic cities, towns and areas of high deprivation across the country, bringing revitalisation to the Church and seeing communities transformed.

St Paul's Fundraising Shop

Our Church shop on Ansdell hill is a blessing in so many ways. The money raised has provided food for families in the Parish who are struggling with the cost of living rise, as well as other good causes linked to our Christian values. The money also supports the mission of St. Paul's Church by helping to pay towards the running of the church, which is particularly important at the moment as Church costs have risen significantly.

The shop also provides an important service for people within the parish and beyond so that they can buy goods more affordably such as clothes, toys, soft furnishings and kitchenware, which helps support families in these difficult times. We have many regular customers who rely on the shop for a friendly chat and a warm space as well as good quality pre-used goods.

When customers visit our shop they often say that our fundraising shop feels quite different to other charity shops. They are also increasingly made aware of the work we do as a church and are able to meet members of St. Paul's which lead to conversations about our Christian faith and may, hopefully, encourage new parishioners to join our congregation.

So as church members what can we do to help the fundraising shop? We can donate good quality goods, volunteer time to do a shift in the shop and at the same time chat to the customers. We can pray for the shop, so that it becomes a beacon for the

Christian faith for customers and volunteers. At this time of year as we celebrate Epiphany after the birth of our saviour into the world, who brings hope and love, our humble fundraising shop can provide a taste of that faith, hope and love.

St Paul's Outside Support Fund

Each year St Paul's commits £1000 to supporting financially Christian ministries which we also regularly support in prayer for. These organisations make Jesus known in word, as well as deed.

In 2022, St Paul's gave:

£250 - Crosslinks

This is a mission agency which we are exploring partnering with missionaries from, now that the De Leeuws have returned from South Sudan.

£250 – Christians Against Poverty

This charity works to help people become debt free, and sharing the good news of Jesus as they do.

£250 - The Bridge Project

This project, run by the Salvation Army, supports adults in Blackpool who are homeless or in vulnerable housing situations.

£250 - Embrace the Middle East

This is a development and aid agency working in the Middle East, which one of our church members recently travelled to Israel to experience their work.

Please pray that this money would enable more people to hear and respond to Jesus themselves, ands be served in his name.

Food Parcels

St Paul's also commits 10% of any profit from the Fundraising Shop to be given to ministries or organisations the PCC has discerned it is right to support.

Using money from 2021 we continued to provide food parcels for local families in food need in 2022. This Christmas we had the joy of supporting 15 families from two local primary school providing Christmas food parcels. These were received with great thanks, tears, and relief from some of those whom they were given too.

Please pray for our local community, especially those in need, that as they have them met in small ways, they might also taste and see the Lord is good.

The PCC will make a decision soon as to where the 2022 shop amount will be used.

Cost-of-Living Crisis Bites Deep

More than four million people in the UK are now being forced to borrow money to cover the cost of essentials, such as heating and food.

Christians Against Poverty (CAP) say that a poll carried out for them by YouGov has found that nearly one fifth of adults in the UK, or about ten million people, are now struggling financially. CAP says that of its clients who have done so, 44 per cent of them have a disability, 42 per cent are single parents, and 47 per cent have suffered abuse.

Higher earners are using up savings, while those on medium to low incomes are having to turn to high-cost credit to survive. One quarter of low earners (earning less than £15,000 a year) have already fallen behind on bills.

Empowering Women in Pakistan with the Word of God

The Bible Society is helping women in Pakistan learn to read by holding regular Bible-based literacy classes in the Khyber region.

"Before the Bible Society came, there was not a single school for girls in this region. Education for girls was considered immoral," says Beena, a former hospital cleaner and mother of eight children. "Now we have started a Bible study group in the family and every day we read two or three chapters. We started with the New Testament."

The literacy rate in Pakistan is 58 per cent, but among Christian women it is estimated to be just 34 per cent. Bible Society hopes to educate 3,500 women in the region by teaching them to read the Bible. If you can help, please visit: https://www.biblesociety.org.uk/get-involved/donate/

Conversion of St Paul 25th January

January is a month of the beginning of great things! As well as the naming of the Son of God, we celebrate the conversion of the greatest ever apostle of the Christian faith. Many books have been written on Paul, and here is the briefest of introductions.

He was a Jew, born as 'Saul' at Tarsus, and brought up by the rabbi Gamaliel as a Pharisee. A devout, fanatical Jew, Saul persecuted the Christians, and watched with satisfaction the first Christian martyrdom, the stoning of Stephen. Then, on his way to Damascus, Saul had a vision of Christ that stopped him in his tracks. He realised that this Jesus whom he was persecuting was in fact the Messiah for whom he had longed.





Saul changed overnight. He was given a new name, Paul, and became an evangelist for the cause of Christ. He became a leader in the early Church, and his special calling was as an apostle to the Gentiles. He wrote epistles to the young churches that he founded - and thus, inadvertently, wrote a great part of the New Testament.

Life as the greatest apostle was hardly full of perks: Paul was stoned, beaten, mobbed, homeless, hated, imprisoned, and finally martyred. Tradition has it that he was beheaded in Rome during the persecution of Nero in 64AD, and buried where the basilica of St Paul 'outside the walls' now stands. His mighty faith in Christ has kindled similar belief in many hundreds of millions of people down the centuries.


Peace with God and goodwill to men, The peace of triumph on the Tree, The rising peace that followed then. The peace of God for you and me.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

18th -25th January 2023



The Epiphany ~ 6th January Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh for the infant Jesus

Epiphany is also known as 'Twelfth Night', or the last night of the Christmas festival. According to the song, it is also the day when that over-enthusiastic 'true love' of yours dumps no less than 78 presents on your doorstep, among them a dozen leaping lords of the realm and a final partridge – to go with the 11 you have already been given.

In many parts of the world, 6th January is celebrated as Christmas Day. As we Western Christians are packing away our tree, the Greek Orthodox world and Catholic Spain are giving presents and celebrating the wise men, or magi. For what better time to give presents to each other, than on the day the wise men presented gold, frankincense and myrrh to the infant Jesus?


What do we make of these presents? Gold is for kingship, proclaiming a royal child. Frankincense carries a feeling of worship about it: it was used in the temple worship and indicated access to the presence of God. Frankincense is thus for worship and incarnation.

The third gift, myrrh, finds it place at Calvary. After the crucifixion, Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea prepared Jesus' body for burial, using myrrh as an embalming fluid. Thus, when the wise men visit the baby Jesus, the shadow of the cross already falls across the crib. But myrrh is also symbolic of love, so you could say that the third gift is about adoration as well as death. And Christ's death on the cross is for love of the Church, His bride.

As for the magi, they were not Jewish grandees, but foreign Gentiles. And so it was clear, from as early as the manger in Bethlehem, that Jesus was not just the Messiah for the Jews, but the Saviour of the whole world.






Ministry on Ice
