

Letter from the Vicarage...

At the heart of the Coronation service is a precious and important moment – the anointing of the monarch with oil. Recently details for this aspect of King Charles III's coronation have been released. The oil to be used is from olive groves outside Jerusalem. The canopy which will cover King Charles in this hidden moment will have the names of the fifty-six countries of the commonwealth embroidered on it.



The anointing with oil is an ancient biblical act. But the symbolic act speaks of a far greater anointing. It speaks of the gift and need of the Holy Spirit. In the coronation service the anointing sets apart the monarch for the task of ruling. But it comes in the context of a prayer for God the Father to give the Spirit to the monarch to enable them to carry out such a weighty responsibility, and in a way which not only blesses the nation, but pleases God himself. Without the Spirit, the King is unable to fulfil his calling to rule.

But that need is also the need of every one of us. None of us will be monarchs of nations. But as humans made in the image of God, we are made to rule and steward this world. We are made to be vice-regents of the Great King, reflecting his ways and representing his good purposes in the world. To be most truly ourselves – we are made to be kings and queens under God.

Yet as we each act as our own rulers in God's world, fail to steward his world, and define our own image rather than reflecting his, we fail to be who we are made to be. We fail to rule the world rightly. As the writer to the Hebrews says of humanity "Yet at present we do not see everything subject to them." (Hebrews 2:8) Worse than this, we face the eternal consequences of being rebels. We cannot change ourselves.

We need the gift of God's Holy Spirit. Jesus himself said 'Very truly I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless they are born of water and the Spirit.' (John 3:5). But wonderfully to all who trust in Jesus, the King of Kings, that precious gift is promised.

To be made new by the Holy Spirit sets us apart in restored relationship with God. From there, He enables us, bit by bit, to be

remade into who we were created to be. How we are meant to live. How we are meant to exercise God's purposes in the world. He gives us a future when one day we will reign with Jesus. Without the Spirit we are unable to fulfil our calling to rule. We cannot be truly human. But with him, we can.

So in these days ahead of King Charles III's coronation, please honour our king by praying for him. Seek the Lord to give him his Holy Spirit that he might rule in way which honours the Lord, and blesses our nation. Pray that he would know the Holy Spirit's gift of new birth in his life. But also use this time to pray for yourself. Seek the Lord to give you his Holy Spirit that you might be restored into relationship with God, and remade into the person he has truly made you and I to be.

The Coronation of King Charles III

On 6th May His Majesty King Charles III will be crowned alongside Camilla, The Queen Consort, in Westminster Abbey. How can we pray for him, as he approaches this important event? Paul says: 'I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for kings and all those in authority, that we may



for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness.' (1 Timothy 2:1,2).

For God's presence - to guide every aspect of King Charles' life as he prepares for his Coronation and future roles. At his Accession, he was proclaimed Defender of the Faith, the Supreme Governor of the Church of England. Charles has talked about 'the Sovereign's particular relationship and responsibility towards the Church of England - the Church in which my own faith is so deeply rooted.'

For God's wisdom - as he provides leadership that will honour God and promote the wellbeing of our society. King Solomon prayed for wisdom for himself: 'So give your servant a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong.' (1 Kings 3:9).

For God's love - to strengthen all relationships within the Royal Family; for reconciliation, understanding, forgiveness and good communication.

For God's purpose - to be fulfilled through the work of the King and Queen Consort and their family in the years to come. He has said: 'and whatever may be your background or beliefs, I shall endeavour to serve

you with loyalty, respect and love, as I have throughout my life.'

What Jesus has done in my life...

Below are a couple of the stories of individuals who were baptised and/ or confirmed at St Paul's on March 26th. Jesus is alive today and working in people's lives!

Richard's Storv

"I was raised as Christian but stopped attending church when I was fifteen. I have spent most of my life as either an atheist or agnostic although I have always had an interest in religion and philosophy and the many questions of existence.

Over the last few years, I began to see a tension between my belief in a purely material and purposeless universe and my observation that the things we value most are not material at all. My rational mind was telling me one thing, but I had a longing in my heart that I couldn't deny either. I was in a state of wanting to believe but wasn't prepared to do so without proof. In effect I wanted Jesus to appear in front of me and make his existence undeniable! I had heard many people say that you have to ask Jesus into your heart. I never put much stock in the idea, but eventually I did just that. I found myself just two weeks later taking the big step of walking into St Paul's on a Good Friday.

My parents were Christians their whole life but decided not to have me baptised so I could make that decision myself. It took me a while! But I am being baptised as a witness to the death of my old life and celebrate my birth into a new one as a follower of Christ.

With God's help, I have discovered a new purpose and a deeper understanding of his love for me. God has done something truly astonishing; he loved us so much he was willing to come to Earth and die for us so we might be forgiven. Knowing how much God loves us shows us our life is a precious gift, not to be squandered or taken for granted but lived to the full, by loving God, loving life and living a life of love."



Mike's Story

"As an infant, I was baptised in the Church of England. As a young teenager, I turned away from Jesus and chose not to be confirmed. Although I messed up in life quite a bit, I always trusted that things would turn out ok in the end. Maybe this was not just a foolish hope, as I now realise that Jesus did not abandon me. I messed up by not following Him, but He kept me from the worst of harm and has waited for me to come to Him. After Judith came into my life, around 18 years ago, I began to attend the United Reformed Church with her. We were led to St Paul's during the pandemic, and it was then that my learning advanced more rapidly and deeply, and my faith became stronger.

Jesus has shown us that, through Him, God's grace is there for us, whenever we decide to turn to Him. The more I learn from the Bible the more I realise that, where I went wrong and where the world is going wrong, has been in not following Jesus and recognising him as Lord. Having faith in Jesus gives me peace, whatever troubles beset us, and shows me my way in life. Now, I am ready to declare my faith and have it recognised."

Retire and do what you want. That's what they said at work. So what did we do? – we went to work in the fundraising shop. The work is fun, frustrating, exciting, exasperating, physically challenging at times (the steps), technically challenging (the till) all at the same time but we love to go and see our new friends, both customers and fellow volunteers.

We are two of the newbies, but we were made welcome and feel as though we have been there years, although it isn't even 12 months yet since we signed up. Because Keith is in a wheelchair, there were some initial barriers to overcome, such as the step into the shop and lack of turning space behind the till. The limited 'small room' requirements and the fire exit at the back of the shop. These 'problems' were overcome with a smile and lots of head scratching; some of the issues are ongoing but the welcome for Keith was so warm we just tackled the situation with a 'can do' mentality and got on with the job.

'Job' or 'work' is the term we use for our afternoons in the shop. Yes, it is volunteering and not paid work but we know we are helping to provide funds for St Paul's and the various charities they support through the shop.

The collection of goods on sale is quite eclectic and thanks to the volunteers who toil in the basement, our stock is regularly refreshed with new, different items. If you don't like what we have in on one day, wait till tomorrow and something new may have come in.

Many of our customers like shopping with us because not only can they acquire bargains on the racks and groaning shelves, but the atmosphere is friendly, we sometimes have time to chat, this welcoming feel envelops the shop. The customers often comment that the shop is not like other charity shops. 'Something special' a customer once said to us. One day we may have an opportunity to tell that customer why there is something special in that shop on the corner of Woodlands Road. The hint is above the shop door. 'Serving Jesus'. We pray at the start of each day and we now pray at the close of business.

If you can't pop into the shop, you might like to join in the prayer time at home.

PCC Update

Some headlines from the PCC meeting in April:

The PCC reflected on the Jesus' command to 'go and bear fruit'. Seeing the life of Jesus bear fruit in our lives, and in the lives of those who don't yet know Jesus is why we exist as a church. The image of a healthy vine needing a trellis to grow up was considered. As a PCC, the work it does in stewarding finances, structures, vision, and buildings is not an end in itself. It is to be the structure which helps the vine work of the church.

Being the first meeting after the Annual Parish Meeting, the PCC elected key positions and committees, as well as reviewed its role as trustees and its public benefit duty.


The PCC heard from its two newest members - Mike Fenton (our new church warden) and Peter Hinkson (our new Deanery Synod representative) – who they are, what brought them to St Paul's, what the best thing about being a follower of Jesus is, and a dream they have for St Paul's. It was a great encouragement to hear the work God has been doing in their lives. Ask Mike and Peter about it when you see them!

The PCC were updated on the conditional appointment of a new Fundraising Shop Manager and Church Community Worker, as well as reviewed and increased the role salary.

The PCC received reports on finances and fabric, as well as ratified a safeguarding procedure for responding to allegations.

Ascension Day ~ 18th May 40 Davs with the Risen Christ

40 days after Easter comes Ascension Day. These are the 40 days during which the Risen Christ appeared again and again to His disciples, His death following and resurrection. (Matthew 28: Mark 16: Luke 24: and John 20.)



During those 40 days, Jesus was seen by numerous of His disciples: on the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, in houses, etc. He strengthened and encouraged His disciples, and at last opened their eyes to all that the Scriptures had promised about the Messiah. Jesus also told them that as the Father had sent Him, He was now going to send them - to all corners of the earth, as His witnesses.

Luke records the story, which took place on Ascension Day, with great poignancy: 'When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, He lifted up His hands - and blessed them.'

As Christmas began the story of Jesus' life on earth, so Ascension Day completes it, with His return to His Father in heaven. Jesus' last act on earth was to bless His disciples. He and they had a bond as close as could be: they had just lived through three tumultuous years of public ministry and miracles – persecution and death – and resurrection! Just as we part from our nearest and dearest by still looking at them with love and memories in our eyes, so exactly did Jesus: 'While He was blessing them, He left them and was taken up into heaven.' (Luke 24:50-1) He was not forsaking them, but merely going on ahead to a kingdom which would also be theirs one day: 'I am ascending to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God...' (John 20:17)

The disciples were surely the most favoured folk in history. Imagine being one of the last few people on earth to be face to face with Jesus, and to have Him look on you with love. No wonder then that Luke goes on: 'they worshipped Him, and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.' (Luke 24:52,53)

No wonder they praised God! They knew they would see Jesus again one day! 'I am going to prepare a place for you... I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.' (John 14:2,3) In the meantime, Jesus had work for them to do: to take the Gospel to every nation on earth

Pentecost Prayer

How much more will your Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him... (Luke 11:13b)

Heavenly Father,

In these troubled times we need your help, just like those first disciples did when Jesus came back to you after his resurrection. They must have wanted him to stay with them. They must have felt puzzled and bereft — and wondered how to go on.



But you, Lord, knew a better way. You sent them a helper, the Holy Spirit to fill them with your life. We thank you so much that the same Spirit will be our helper too, if we are willing to ask you for him. We will be able to face each day, each challenge, with your Spirit living in us to guide and empower us, to enable us to carry on even when we don't understand.

So, we pray, come Holy Spirit, fill us, encourage us to carry on sharing your love and life and truth, in the name of Jesus. Amen.

Renaissance


(Romans 8:28 - 30)






