Letter from the Vicarage...

A number of years ago there was a programme on television called 'What not to wear' (I was not a regular viewer!) In it two fashion experts, Trinny and Susannah, would descend on the life and wardrobe of the make-over volunteer. Clothes which were shabby, worn or not in keeping with the make-over which was to take place went in bin bags for the charity shop. Instead, out came a new wardrobe in keeping with the 'new' them. Of course, the



transformation was superficial – a change on the level of hair, makeup and dress. But the idea of getting rid of old clothes, and putting on new dress to match our identity is at the heart of what it is to be a Christian.

This term we have been looking at the Apostle Paul's letter to the Ephesians on a Sunday morning. It has given a glorious vision of the church from God's perspective, enabling us to consider what it means to be 'a loving family' as followers of Jesus. In the second half the letter Paul applies this new identity as God's people in practice. It will help us consider the next part of our identity statement as well, being 'wholehearted disciples.'

Central to being a disciple is to recognise the new identity which Jesus gives anyone who comes to him in trust. There is nothing superficial about it. We have gone from dead in sin to alive to God, from alienated from God to being deeply loved by him, from trapped by powers outside of us to those in whom the Spirit of God lives. The Christian has been made new in the most wonderful and significant way.

To live out the Christian life is to 'dress' in line with our new identity. In effect Paul says 'this is who you are in Jesus, dress like it.' But this dressing has nothing to do with a certain fashion sense. It is about the kind of life we now live. Paul says 'You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self...and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.' (Ephesians 4:22-24)

With the help of the Holy Spirit, we are to go through the wardrobes of our lives, and take out any clothes which don't match the new us in Christ – anger, lying, bitterness, lust, greed and more. They are to go

in the bin bag and put behind us. In their place we are to put on our new wardrobe, a life lived in likeness to God – forgiveness, kindness, and other centeredness.

It is not that we try to live as new people to be accepted by God. But having been accepted by him and helped by the Spirit, we live a new life in keeping with who we now are.

So if you are a follower of Jesus, can I encourage you to do a mental check of your wardrobe? Ask – is the way I think about life, or respond to people, or act in situations, in keeping with the new me? If not, ask God to help you to put it in the bin bag, and put on the likeness of Jesus in its place.

PCC Update

Some headlines from the PCC meeting in May:

- The PCC began by looking at Acts 16 and the human discernment and divine direction involved in the good news moving forward. This is a pattern for us seeking God's vision for us.
- ◆ It began to consider a three year plan for St Paul's. In 2026 the Diocese Vision will have reached its goal, and Paul will have been at St Paul's ten years. The PCC spent time asking 'what are our aims or hopes for St Paul's in three years?'
- The PCC discussed changes to the pattern of administration of Holy Communion, in line with much of the Diocese, and taking into account changes during Covid were accommodations, and not designed to be permanent.
- The PCC passed updated procedures in the Fundraising Shop, including a trial of allowing 'well behaved' dogs in the shop.
- The PCC heard back on updates on the lease negotiations for the Fundraising Shop, discussed them and confirmed their previous decision. The PCC have agreed to a 5 year lease which has the ability to run until December 2028, with a break clause at December 2025. Following December 2028, we may be able to seek a new lease should we wish, but there is no guarantee of securing one. This may mean seeking alternative premises at that point, but is to be held in balance with the reality that a lot can change in five years. We hope this lease gives a degree of security, but also flexibility going forward.
- The PCC considered church finances and ratified the Hardship Fund, appointing a small committee to help deliver it.
- The PCC received reports on fabric, agreed to purchase items for church use, and were informed about Safeguarding training.

Lytham Club Day and Rose Queen Festival

Lytham Club Day and Rose Queen Festival was founded in 1894, making it 129 years old this year. The only times it has been cancelled have been during the first and second world wars; and more recently, in 2020 or 2021 due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

The event begins with a procession through the beautiful town of Lytham. It features the Rose Queen and the Rose Queen Elect with their retinues, both of which are supported by their church families. Joining the procession are the visiting Queens and retinues, marching bands and dancers, decorated floats, classic cars and much more besides.

It's a day for everyone – from Punch & Judy shows throughout the day to Morris Dancers and performers all over town. After the parade, the day continues at Lytham Hall with the crowning of the Rose Queen Elect. This is followed by an afternoon and evening of entertainment, games, food stalls and fun for all the family.

And with all of these developments we continue to provide good quality goods at reasonable prices for the community of Ansdell.

Looking forward, I am excited to think that Joe will continue all of these in addition to putting his own stamp on the shop. We pray for increased interaction between customers, volunteers, staff and clergy, leading to conversations about why the shop is as it is and what the guiding force behind it is. We hope and pray that more of us will be able to respond to the big questions and so add to those who turn to St Paul's Church and to God.

SPIRIT

Praise to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Ghost.

Nigel Beeton writes:

Trinity Sunday is not, perhaps, one of the glorious highlights of the Christian calendar, just the start of a long series of 'proper' Sundays that will take us through to Advent. And yet the doctrine of a triune Godhead is central to our Christianity; I'm not a trained theologian, and many can explain it better than I, but I hope I've captured the basics in this little poem! Tune: Brother James' Air.

Trinity Sunday ~ 4th June Celebrating Our God, Who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself — way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty — is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are *of* the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

- Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one'
- ◆ Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.'
- Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...'
- Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'
- John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'
- Luke 24:49 manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that warmth and life are there as well.

Celebrating Fatherhood

'What is a Christian? The richest answer I know is that a Christian is one who has God as Father. If you want to know how well a person understands Christianity, find out how much he makes of the thought of being God's child and having God as his Father.'

(J I Packer, Knowing God)

The month we celebrate fathers on Father's Day. Unlike Mothering Sunday, this doesn't have a distinctly Christian origin. However, it does provide an opportunity the celebrate God's fatherhood and what it means for us.

At His baptism, as Jesus came out of the water: 'heaven was opened, and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on Him. And a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, whom I love; with Him I am well pleased.' (Matthew 3:16,17). What can we learn about Jesus' relationship with His Father, the role of fathers and our relationship with God?

The Father's presence

When Jesus was baptised, the Father made His presence real by the Holy Spirit. It's the Spirit who enables us to call God 'daddy' (abba, Galatians 4:6). God is with us and knows our joys and sorrows, fears and trials. In this way, dads can relate to their children.

The Father's love

The Father described His Son as 'beloved', who like us, is subject to His unconditional love. Dads should be constant in assuring their children of their love.

The Father's pleasure

The Father tells Jesus that He is 'well pleased' with Him. We also need to hear this, if we feel that we are disappointing God or letting Him down. This can arise with harsh words spoken by our parents. Fathers should use every opportunity to demonstrate their pleasure in their children, especially when things go wrong.






Holding

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
Laundry
