

Letter from the Vicarage...

Maybe because we are in Ephesians on Sunday mornings with its famous image of 'putting on the full armour of God', my mind has been on some of the language in the Bible, which we have lost a little these days. I am thinking particularly of the language of battle, warfare and conquest. Some of our famous hymns are full of it - 'Onward Christian soldiers' and 'Fight the good fight'. In recent years, there seems to be hesitancy around those themes.



It is true that we see the devastating consequences of war in our world. It breaks our hearts. Maybe seeing this leads us to hold back on this language? Certainly the Bible never glorifies war. Indeed it promises that Jesus is the one who will end all wars.

Maybe it is because of some of the church's history? Examples such as conquest by force in the Crusades cause us to grieve at actions done in our Lord's name which did not honour him.

But while being sensitive to these, it is clear that the Bible uses this language to help us understand our world and mission.

We are in a battle, but our battle is not with flesh and blood

"For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms." (Ephesians 6:12)

The Bible uses language of warfare because we are in a war! Raging around us (even if we don't see it) is a battle. If we are trusting Jesus, we are enlisted in his ranks. It is a battle Jesus will win (his resurrection has sealed it), but it is not yet fully seen.

But it is not a battle against people. It is a spiritual battle. The devil wages war against God's good purposes. He works that out at times through people. But our battle is with him.

In this battle, <u>we are not just on the defensive.</u> Christ is taking his church forward 'gaining ground' as more people come to know Jesus and find freedom under his good rule. Christ will be seen on the last day to be victorious – having defeated those that stand against him, and having won for himself a people. But this conquest is not in the way we see it worked out in our world.

³For though we live in the world, we do not wage war as the world does. ⁴The weapons we fight with are not the weapons of the world. On the contrary, they have divine power to demolish strongholds. ⁵We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God, and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ" (2 Cor 10:3-5)

Unlike some in other religions who take up weapons and instil fear in order to win converts, we reject that. Instead we take God's word and in the power of the Spirit (not in any use of force) we hold forth Christ. We pull strongholds down but not to destroy people. In fact, just the opposite - to set them free. We hold forth our mighty but gentle saviour who conquers hearts, and in doing so brings life in its fullness. It confidence in Jesus' victory which actually frees us from temptation to use force in any way.

So let's be aware of the spiritual battle, have confidence in Jesus' increasing victory. But not respond in the world's way but instead take up the weapons of our crucified by conquering Lord.

Three Year Plan

In 2026 Blackburn Diocese will be 100 years old, and Paul (God willing) will have been Vicar here for 10 years. He, along with the PCC, is in the process forming a 3 year plan as a church.

While there is much to give thanks for in the past few years, and we should be encouraged by the Lord taking us forward, it has also been a period (in part because of adjusting to and coming out of the period of the pandemic) where our sights have often been on the short to middle distance. The aim is to form a plan for the medium term which can help guide us through those three years and help steer our decisions and actions.

In Acts 16 as Paul and his companions head into new mission fields we see two dynamics – human discernment and divine direction. Human discernment as they reflect on God's priorities and revealed plan for the gospel to go to the ends of the earth, and discern the best course to bring that about. But the Lord also directs them specifically along that way. We want to use God's gift of discernment as we look at this revealed word to see what priorities he ways we should have, but also seek his leading in the specifics of our situation.

Please commit to praying with us. "Heavenly Father, we desire to be a church which displays your wisdom to the universe (Ephesians 3:10). Lead us by godly discernment from your word, and your divine prompting to discern the priorities you would have us have, to be that church for these coming three years. Amen.'

But we would like your input too. Please prayerful reflect on this question, and let us know anything which is laid on your heart:

By the end of 2026, what would your aims/hopes be for St Paul's?



Editor: Some folk may recognise this as an article that I have run before; but as we consider a Three Year Plan for St. Paul's, maybe we should look to the example set for us by the early Christians in Jerusalem.

Acts for Everyone

With over 3000 people becoming Christians at Pentecost, the early Church was established in Jerusalem (Acts 2: 42-47). This new community is a yardstick for what church can be like in every age, including our own.

A learning community:

'They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching.' (42). The new Christians were eager to learn from the apostles about their new faith. They were a community that was always learning. Is this true for us: ourselves, in groups and as a church family?

A loving community:

They had 'everything in common' (44) and gave 'to anyone as he had need' (45). This was an expression of the 'fellowship' (42) they enjoyed with one another. This doesn't mean that normal Christian community has no private ownership, but the church is to offer a radically different community to the world around. It reflects the loving relationship found in God himself. Is this true of our church life?

A worshipping community:

'Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God.' (46,47). They met both in the temple, and in homes to worship. It was a heartfelt response to all that Jesus had done in their lives. Is such worship the basis of the whole of their lives, not just what we do on Sunday?

A witnessing community:

This community shone out with God's love, resulting in them 'enjoying the favour of all the people.' (47). The impact of this resulted in 'the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.' (47). Can we say this of our own church? 'we need to humble ourselves before His sovereign authority.. not to quench Him but to allow Him His freedom' (John Stott).

Mary Magdalene By Canon Paul Hardingham

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene, who is remembered on 22nd July in the church's calendar. What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past:

When Jesus encountered Mary, He cast seven demons out of her (Luke 8:2). As a result, her life was transformed and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been before. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Put Jesus at the centre of our world:

Along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (Luke 8:1-3), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (Matthew 27:55 -56) and one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1 and John 20:1-18). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest in the world:

Mary is a great example of Paul's words: 'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong.' (1 Corinthians 1:27). At a time when women were regarded as second-class citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously.

We should be careful not to dismiss the things that don't follow our expectations, because Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary, and if we let Him, He can do it through us!




The Bible in 50 Words



"What's that next hut?"


"I built that hut to be my church."
