### A few words from your Reader...

Dear Friends,

We are well into our journey through Lent and I wonder how it is progressing? Did you promise to give up something for Lent, like chocolate, biscuits or maybe even your cups of tea or coffee? Maybe you decided to take on



something extra such as in-depth Bible study, longer prayer times or perhaps reading a Lenten book. Whatever your choices, there will have been times when you may well have felt like giving up. Maybe you've thought 'What's the point?' or 'Who's going to notice?' or 'Who's going to care?'

If we look at the situation from a different perspective, what would have happened if Jesus had given up when he was all alone in the wilderness without food or water? What if he'd agreed to do what the devil said and turned the stones into bread to satisfy his hunger? What if he had trusted the angels to save him as he leapt from the temple in order to prove that he was the Son of God? What if he'd agreed to become master of all that he could see in return for worshipping the devil?

The thing is that Jesus was 100% obedient to the will of his Father. He was 100% committed to the task that was set before him. If he ever had doubts or fears, we don't hear about them, except for one instance in the Garden of Gethsemane, when he begged that the cup be taken from him. It was at this point that there was no turning back from what lay ahead ~ the pain and humiliation; the desertion by his much-loved disciples; and an horrific death upon the cross. Is it not a humbling thought that Jesus went through all of this for you and for me? He loved the people of this world so much that he was prepared to die upon a cross and take our sins with him, once and for all!

I don't know about you, but I always find Holy Week and Easter a very emotional time. On the one hand we are looking forward to Easter and the Resurrection and yet on the other, we re-live each painful step of the journey towards the cross beginning with the triumphant entry into Jerusalem, and followed by a Last Supper with

his disciples before finally suffering the isolation of the Crucifixion.

But, as we all know, that wasn't the end of the story because on the third day Jesus rose again, in victory. He had conquered death; all the pain and suffering was behind him. Through his death and resurrection, Jesus has created for us a fresh start; a clean slate free of sin. He died that we might be forgiven!

"In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins." (1 John 4:10)

So, I invite all of you, whoever you are, to share in that journey as the family of St. Paul's prepares once again to witness to the final week of Christ's life. Join us on Palm Sunday and receive your palm cross. Share in the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday. Witness as part of Churches Together on Good Friday; and raise your voices as we celebrate the Risen Christ on Easter Sunday. The dates and times of all our services can be found on the back page.

I wish you all Happy Easter, blessed with joy and peace!


**Lent Lunches** - St Paul's is hosting the Lent Lunch plus Organ Recital on March 9th. The other venues are yet to be agreed.

### **Eight Hundred Acts of Kindness**

A village in North Somerset has undertaken 800 individual acts of kindness to celebrate its local church. The village of Congresbury has exceeded its challenge of more than 800 good deeds to celebrate 800 years of its local parish church, St Andrews. The 3,500 villagers have been taking part in the anonymous *Love Congresbury* project, where the good deed is written on a small note and posted at the church. Becci North, one of the organisers of *Love Congresbury* and an active member of the church told Premier that the deeds "range from somebody mowing somebody's lawn, giving somebody a lift to hospital, giving aid to Calais." She said she was "absolutely amazed; it's been wonderful to think that so many people have embraced it, of all ages, all backgrounds of faith, of no faith." Becci said that it was a way of enforcing community and "spreading God's love through the community."

### Pay of the Month

### Mothering Sunday ~ 6th March 2016

There is an old Jewish saying:

God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers.

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.



In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families - which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its



name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed and in many ways now resembles the American Mothers' Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.

Thank you for Jesus; for his life and death, but most of all for His resurrection, which makes all things new and possible.





### The Top 10 Bible Stories: No. 3: The Crucifixion of Jesus

'Of what conceivable significance, for us today, is the death of a Jew in Palestine two thousand years ago?'

In this month's Must Know Story we will address this question as we look at the meaning of Jesus' crucifixion. On the cross Jesus dealt with the problem of our sin. Peter writes, 'He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by



his wounds you have been healed' (1 Peter 2:24). Jesus died in our place, bore our sins and took our guilt, to pay the full penalty for our sin and to set us free from addiction, fear and ultimately death.

On 31st July 1941 a prisoner escaped from Auschwitz. As a reprisal the Gestapo arbitrarily selected ten men to die in the starvation bunker, including a man called Francis Gajinisdek. He cried out, 'My poor wife and my children. They'll never see me again.' In response an unimpressive looking Polish man stepped forward and said, 'I'm a Catholic priest. I don't have a wife and children and I am willing to die instead of this man.'

Maximilian Kolbe was the name of this priest and he went with the others into the bunker. Remarkably he got the prisoners praying and singing hymns and transformed the atmosphere in the bunker. He was the last person to die and after two weeks he was given a lethal injection and died at the age of 47.

Jesus death was even more amazing than this, because He didn't simply die for one man, but for every individual in the world. If you or I had been the only person in the world, Jesus Christ would still have died in our place. 'Hallelujah, what a Saviour'!!


