

Clay Pots: The Apostle Paul's description of what we are in relation to the Divine Potter. Might go some way towards explaining the glazed expression that so many of us wear.





Bible Sunday

Date ~ 23rd October

On Bible Sunday we celebrate the most popular book in the world and yet it sits on many western shelves, unopened and unread.

Many countries, including our own, have created societies based on the rules, wisdom and values found within its pages. Phrases found in the Bible, such as 'turn the other cheek' or 'go the extra mile', are part of our everyday language and its stories have inspired many of our greatest works of art.

This is also the book for which people have given their lives to the flames, for which people have risked everything so they could smuggle it into repressive countries, the book that people in distant countries, this very day, are desperate to own, as we can see from the following story:

Meeting demand for Scripture in China

Fourteen years ago, Tang Xinnian's husband ripped up her Bible because he didn't like her going to church. It was her only copy, destroyed and unreadable.

But when Xinnian heard that a Bible Society team was visiting a village near her home to hand out Bibles, she walked for two hours across the country to get one. 'Today I'm so happy to get a Bible!' said Xinnian, 46, a farmer and mother-of-two. 'I've been a Christian for 20 years and was baptised last year. I have God in my heart all the time, but I haven't had a Bible for 14 years.'



Xinnian is just one member of China's rapidly-growing Church.

It's estimated the number of Christians in China could double within the next decade – and the Bible Society needs to provide five million Bibles a year for every new believer to have one.

'He Gave Us Cyes To See Them' ~ The Choir Stall

(Editor: I found this article in the 'God in the Arts' Section of the Parish Pump website and thought it would be of interest to our readers.)

'Let all the world in ev'ry corner sing My God and King.' George Herbert's poem from 'The Temple' tells us that 'the church with psalms must shout. No door can keep them out.' It is a reminder of the rich tradition of music in our worship that reaches back to the people of the Old Testament praising the Lord. 2 Chronicles 5 paints a vivid picture of musicians and singers gathered to welcome the Ark of the Lord to Solomon's Temple.

Because music is such an important part of worship, churches have set aside places for the singers to offer praise and petition. Some of the most wonderful choir stalls in the land can be found in Lancaster Priory, the parish church of St Mary. They are 14 in total, the third oldest choir stalls in England dating back to the 14th century. John Ruskin called them the finest in the country. The canopies are richly decorated with foliage and carved heads, and they enclose tapestries from the 1970s that depict saints and shields. Beneath are the seats: misericords with carvings that have survived the vandalism of the Civil War.

We can imagine the medieval monks gathered in these stalls to sing the offices. Today the stalls are a resplendent, harmonious blend of the old and the new – a work of beauty for the eye, just as the music offered there is a work of beauty for the ear. The word 'choir' means a

dance to God, and the Priory has a fine choir whose chants and hymns dance from side to side of the chancel and resound in the air. But the music sung there is not just for our enjoyment: its focus is God. Herbert tells us that the songs we create here in our churches on earth have no other destination but the courts of heaven.

Prayer of trust in God's Word.




