during which we all focus our attention on the long road stretching towards the cross.

I was desperately uncomfortable and deeply saddened by that experience – I also felt challenged and it is that challenge which is presented before us all now. This season of Lent challenges each of us to tell the Good News of Christ crucified, risen and ascended; of a loving, caring and supporting Father who will enfold us in his arms and keep us safe – if only those with ears to hear will listen and take heed.
